Meaning behind the words.....

Maundy — from the Latin word "mandatum"

it is from a verb that means "to give" or "to order" — command. After Jesus and the disciples finished the Last Supper and walked toward Gethsemane, Jesus taught them a new commandment — "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34).

Tenebrae — Latin for "shadows" or "darkness"

Tenebrae is usually held the evening of Good Friday and includes the gradual dimming of the lights and extinguishing of candles. The Christ candle is removed from the sanctuary and a concluding "Strepitus" or loud noise (slamming shut the Bible) symbolizes the earthquake and agony of creation at the death of Christ.









PASTOR'S PEN

Dear friends in Christ,

One of my most sacred Easter memories is from an Easter sunrise service when I was growing up at First Lutheran Church in my hometown of Northwood, IA. We entered a very dark church that morning with the sanctuary still stripped bare of altar cloths, flowers, etc., from the Friday evening Tenebrae service. At a certain moment, my dad (the senior pastor) announced loudly "Halleluiah! Christ is risen!" and we all answered, "Christ is risen indeed! Halleluiah!"



And at that moment, the organ and trumpets started that wonderful old hymn "Christ Our Lord Is Risen Today." And the altar guild (plus reinforcements) began reassembling the front of the church with dozens of lilies and the altar cloths, etc. And the choir marched in. And the congregation, full of extra voices for the occasion, began singing.

But the most remarkable part of that particular Easter morning was the sun. My dad liked to time the Easter sunrise service with the actual sunrise, and that morning it worked miraculously. Because at the very moment when the congregation responded "Halleluiah!," the sun hit the stained-glass windows of the church, sending its multi-colored rays and sparkles throughout the sanctuary and causing us all to gasp in response. The Son had risen indeed!

We are just three weeks away from Easter, and so far during our Lenten Journey to the Cross, we have learned about the first disciples, the 70 who Jesus sent out ahead of him; the healing of the 10 lepers, only one of whom returned to thank Jesus; and the healing of a blind man on the side of the road as Jesus walked to Jericho. Next week, Pastor Lane will talk about the Prodigal Son (also known as the Gracious Father), and we'll finish our Lenten journey with Zacchaeus, the "wee little man" who climbed a sycamore tree to see Jesus.

This is my first Lent and Easter season as your pastor (and as a fully ordained pastor!) and I feel so blessed to be leading worship during this sacred time. I hope you'll join us for the remaining journey to (and from) the cross:

- Wednesdays (April 3 & 10) at 5:30 pm for supper, followed by worship at 7 pm.
- Sunday, April 14, at 9:15 for a special Praise Band Palm Sunday service, including our Noisy Sunday offering.
- Maundy Thursday, April 18, at 7 pm for Holy Communion service, including First Communion for our fifth graders.
- ◆ Good Friday Tenebrae service, April 19, at 8 pm.
- Easter Sunday at 6:30 a.m. (sunrise) and 9:15 a.m. with breakfast in between served by our youth.

This year, we'll begin our sunrise service in the cemetery and process into the church (weather permitting). And yes, we have timed it with the actual sunrise! Who knows what could happen as we celebrate the glorious resurrection of the Son of God. I hope to see you there.

Tall Maple Trees sway in the breeze, 60-70 feet high.

The Sun heat strikes at the snow, which melts and cringes away, retracting.

The voice of Spring's life begins its mighty roar.

The maple sap begins to push its way to buds.

Maple Syrup season is here! The taps are in the trees. The sap is running. It is an early sign that the hard winter is over, warmth and life is on its way.

This winter, for some reason, seemed a little tougher than usual. It might have been the extra helping of snow. It might have been the -35 degree night. In any case it is nice to be out in the woods for the resurrection from the deadness of winter.



Trees first show up in the Bible when God plants them in the garden. There are numerous statutes about trees in the first five books of the Bible, especially fruit trees. The rules are for the most part – if they bear fruit – don't cut them down. Maple trees don't grow in the Mideast. But I can't help thinking that God would have said don't cut them down while they are able to produce sap for maple syrup. The wood of a maple makes gorgeous furniture. The branches cut up make great firewood to boil the sap. So when a maple tree has lived out its life, it is very useful. But while it lives it can be counted on to produce the sweet syrup that gives us a hint of the sweetness of heaven!!!

EASTER EGGS It is hard to pin-point a certain date and time when eggs began to be associated with Easter.



In many cultures around the world, the egg is a symbol of new life, fertility and rebirth In the Christian tradition, Easter eggs are symbolic of the resurrection Christ.

As early as the 13th century, eggs were dyed red as a way to represent the blood of Jesus Christ that was shed on the cross. The hard shell can represent the sealed tomb of Christ and the cracking of the shell can represent Jesus' resurrection from the dead. Egg rolling events, such as happen on the White House lawn each year, can be a symbolic re-enactment of the rolling away of the stone from Christ's tomb.




