"And should I not be concerned about Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand persons who do not know their right hand from their left and also many animals?" Jonah 4:11

Dear believers,

So ends the Book of Jonah. We have spent our Lenten journey with the prophet Jonah this year. After Jonah completes his job as a prophet and the inhabitants of Nineveh repent, God changes God's mind about destroying them. Good news!

But Jonah is "displeased" and "angry." You'd think he'd be happy that these 120,000 souls are saved – along with their animals! But instead Jonah retreats to the shade of a bush – created by God – to pout. To teach him a lesson, God destroys the bush. What follows is a painful conversation between God and Jonah, ending with the question above. We never hear from Jonah again.

We don't know how Jonah answers this final question from God. Does he stay angry about the destruction of his shady bush? Does he understand the lesson God has tried to teach him? Does he realize that he had a second chance – and that God is the God of second chances? Not just for himself, but for an entire city? And thus, for the entire world?

Many elements of Jonah's story offer parallels to Jesus' story. Jonah ends up on a boat in the middle of a stormy sea, as do the disciples (see Matthew 8:23-27). Jonah and Jesus both sleep through the storm. Jonah ends up in the belly of a fish for three days. Our Easter concludes with Jesus' resurrection on the third day.

But the parallels between Jonah's story and Jesus' story end there. The real insights are in God's mercy shown to Jonah and shown to the inhabitants of Nineveh. God gave Jonah a second chance, and God gave the Ninevites a second chance as well.

From the Garden of Eden until now, our God has displayed his magnanimous love for his creation – including the animals! God has shown over and over to be "merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness." (Exodus 34:6) Jesus personifies this mercy, grace, love and faithfulness in his sacrifice and death on the cross. The Easter story proves once and for all that our God is the God of second chances. For me. For you. For the world.

We've been boiling maple sap for a few weeks. I looked in the cupboard and almost all the maple syrup

we made last year was gone! What a great problem to have because we can make more. So far we have 52 gallons of syrup. A big thank you to Lee Hoekstra, Jeff Ellingson, Bruce Bergsgaard, and Paul Brown (my brother-in-law) and their work out at the shack. Money raised goes to the Youth and Family Ministry of Trinity. So keep buying syrup, we'll keep making it.

Maple trees have a sophisticated system for detecting spring. There are photosensors by the hundreds in every single bud, packed with light absorbing pigments called phytochromes. Their job is to take the measure of light every day. Tightly furled, covered in red-brown scales,



each bud holds an embryonic copy of a maple branch, and each bud wants desperately to someday be a full branch. If a bud comes out too soon, it will be killed by freezing. If the bud comes out too late it will miss spring.

When the buds sense spring, they send a hormonal signal down the trunk to the roots, a wake-up call, telegraphed from the upper world to the underworld. The hormone triggers the formation of amylase, the enzyme responsible for cleaving large molecules of starch stored in the roots into small molecules of sugar. When the concentration of sugar in the roots begins to grow, it creates an osmotic gradient that draws water in from the soil. Dissolve in this water from the spring-wet earth, the sugar streams upward as rising sap to feed the buds. The sap travels on a thin layer of phloem and xylem in what is called the cadmium between the bark and the wood of the tree. Thank you to Robin Wall Kimmerer and her book "Braiding Sweet Grass" for most of this information (better than Google!)

MARCH 8, 2023 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS Updates:

- Communications Team streamlined the Time & Talent Survey as the prior one was too overwhelming.
- •Kathy Overland and Sheri Allen will finish auditing the three endowments and WELCA accounts in time for the April Finance Team meeting.
- •Kathy Overland is working with Jacque Wennes to present a new document for the endowments to complete quarterly per Trinity's Constitution for financial review by the Finance Team.
- •The Property Team did a walk through of the church. They are getting bids for steeple work and concrete work at the north entrance. The chimney that is not in use will be taken down by Allen Construction for \$3,600. The Team took up part of the floor in the Fellowship Hall to look at what is underneath. They picked up a radon kit to test the church.
- •The Staffing Team sent message to colleges and area churches for a handbell choir director, have not heard anything back yet. They have talked about making a board with photos of the staff.
- •Volunteers for a committee to explore Trinity Center and Release Time: Barb Gulbranson, Andy Allen, Lorilyn Dehning, Lee Hoekstra, Rachel Udstuen, Michelle Jahnke, Karen Bingham, David Storlie, and Scott Solberg. Pr. Elizabeth has not heard back from the area churches. Pr. Elizabeth will send a follow-up letter to the area churches and will verbally make announcements at worship services.
- •Waste Management's cost of garbage pickup at Trinity has averaged \$500/month. Richard Sanitation said their cost would be \$77/month. A motion was passed to change services.

Motions passed:

- •To have the following Trinity members be a part of the Trinity Center and Release Time Committee: Barb Gulbranson, Andy Allen, Lorilyn Dehning, Lee Hoekstra, Rachel Udstuen, Michelle Jahnke, Karen Bingham, and Scott Solberg.
- •To put Roger Tollefsrud's Estate Gift of \$10,000 toward the steeple project.
- •To send Waste Management a certified letter and an email discontinuing their service immediately.
- •To leave Fair Market Rental Value for the parsonage at \$1,000/month including utilities for the year of 2023. (Auditor Mike Betz stated that Fair Rental Value needs to be on Pastor Elizabeth's W-2 each year).
- •To distribute the \$62,587.66 Employee Retention Credit (ERC) funding as follows: \$3,500 Congregation Consulting Services (paid), \$6,000 First Fruits Benevolence donation, \$26,000 increase loan to ourselves (making \$40,000 available for a loan to ourselves), \$25,087.66 set aside for special projects, \$2,000 bonuses of \$500 each to Scott Solberg, Marlene Deschler, Stewart Storlie, and Gary Wilhelmson.

TRINITY CENTER / RELEASE TIME COMMITTEE This committee had its first meeting March 19. We talked about the importance of being transparent and having open communication. We will work hard to respect the work done by the Education and Property Teams. We feel our job is to pull information together about both release time, the Trinity Center, and trends with Trinity Church in general. Knowing this information is crucial to making informed decisions about the future. We are doing some research on these different topics and hope to be able to share some preliminary information by May.

FINANCE INFORMATION: REMAINING TRANSPARENT While completing an annual review of monies Trinity has held at Merchants Bank over a number of years, the Finance Team became aware that Trinity held more than what is insured by the FDIC per entity. Our Special Accounts for dedicated accounts (ie: stained glass windows, dedicated pastoral support, second parsonage proceeds) put us over the \$250,000 FDIC limit of insurance. The Congregation Council voted to move \$97,037 to New Albin Savings Bank with keeping the same Special Accounts clearly labeled on Trinity's balance sheet. This move also provided Trinity with increased interest rates. Trinity's primary monies used in the day-to-day operations remains with Merchants Bank in Spring Grove for convenient access to deposit and withdraw money to pay invoices and payroll. 
PERSONAL CARE KITS

PRESIDING BISHOP

HOLY SATURDAY, HOLY *space*

They took the body of Jesus and wrapped it with the spices in linen cloths, according to the burial custom of the Jews. Now there was a garden in the place where he was crucified, and in the garden there was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. And so, because it was the Jewish day of Preparation, and the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there (John 19:40-42).

Holy Saturday. A pause. A space between Good Friday and Easter. A full tomb and, except for the guard, an empty garden. Still. Silent.

We don't pay a lot of attention to Holy Saturday other than as our day of preparation for Easter Sunday. The youth group needs to get ready for the Easter breakfast. The altar guild is busy arranging lilies and preparing the altar. Grocery stores are filled. Eggs are dyed. We are occupied with busy anticipation. We have moved on from Good Friday. Even the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night looks forward to and heralds the resurrection.

We, of course, live after the first Easter. We do know how the story turns out, and it would be contrived to be in Holy Saturday as if we didn't know about the resurrection. But we are given this one holy day to pause. We are given this holy space to grieve, to be empty, to realize that life, as we know it, is over.

This is deeply uncomfortable in our culture. We see this on the news when people start to speak about closure immediately after a tragedy. This could be a well-meaning attempt to relieve the pain, but it doesn't heal. There is danger in moving too quickly from grief. It's important to resist the urge to usher the afflicted to "closure."

Grief from the deaths of George Floyd and Tyce Nichols, mass shootings in California and Highland Park, Ill., and other tragedies can't be rushed. None of the Good Fridays in our lives can. The resurrection came after an actual death. The crucifixion wasn't a metaphor. A heart stopped beating. He breathed his last. A son died. Mothers in El Salvador, Ukraine and Chicago's South Side stand at the cross.



But Holy Saturday is more than the necessary and holy space to face death without denial and to grieve without the dulling anesthetic of sentimentality. There is something much deeper going on. It is an invitation to accept that life, as we know it, is over. All of our plans, all of our willfulness and all of our good intentions are over.


On Holy Saturday we are invited to shed our life and enter the tomb. Our effort and righteousness as much as our sin bind us. Our effort to save our lives binds us. This is true as much for the church as it is for each member.

I'm grateful for the faithful innovation and hard work of our people and congregations. I'm not so far removed from parish ministry that I don't remember its struggles as well as its joys. There is something noble and dear about saints who come week after week, year after year to hear and receive the gospel and, as a response to grace, participate in God's reconciling work in the world. But there comes a time to take to heart Jesus' teaching: "For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:25).

The day between Good Friday and Easter can be seen as empty, a void, something to be resisted at all costs, something to be filled. It is the same reaction that many in our culture have to silence. It's as if sound and activity prove that we still exist. But I think the space between crucifixion and resurrection—truly terrifying and truly compassionate—beckons us from our life to life in Christ. After all, it wasn't all the noise and fireworks that got Elijah's attention, but the sound of sheer silence (1 Kings 19:11-13).

When we shed our lives and enter the tomb, when silence is all around, then we see that Jesus is already there ahead of us, anticipating us, welcoming us to be still and to die in him and find our life in him. Rest, dear church. †
