OM OUR PAS

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. When they saw him, they worshipped him, but they doubted. And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Matthew 28:16-20

Dear disciples,

I have probably read this passage from Matthew many dozens of times, but no matter how often you read a familiar passage in the Bible, the next time you read it you are bound to see something new in the text. This text from Matthew's gospel is referred to as "The Great Commission." We read this text this year on Holy Trinity Sunday, but it could just as easily have been read on either of the previous two Sundays. On those two Sundays (Ascension and Pentecost), the disciples are at the end of their time with Jesus. He has been resurrected. Alleluia! He has spent the better part of 50 days (hence the "penta" [5] in Pentecost) teaching them, giving them their final instructions. And now he's leaving them to "sit at the right hand of God" in Heaven.

We tend to focus, rightly, on the "great commission" part of this text: "Go therefore and make disciples ..." It's what the disciples are called to do, and it is also what we are called to do.

But here's the part that jumped out at me as I read it again: "... but they doubted." The disciples were with Jesus on the top of a mountain, but they doubted. They worshipped, but they doubted. They were empowered by the Holy Spirit to do the work of discipleship, but they doubted. They were assured that Jesus was the authoritative God, but they doubted. They were assured that Jesus would be with them always, but they doubted.

This is encouraging for us. Why, you ask, is all this "doubt" encouraging?

Because if the disciples, who spent actual time with the actual Jesus could still have doubts, then it is understandable that we, who rely on the stories told to us in the Bible, will sometimes have doubts as well. Doubt may be the sign of a true disciple. And if those doubting disciples could begin the work of the church, we doubting disciples can continue it.

How would our lives be different if we started our days with hearts and prayers of Thanksgiving gratitude no matter whether our car started or not.

## APRIL 12, 2023 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

#### <u>Updates</u>:

- Kathy Overland and Sheri Allen completed the audit of WELCA, Mission, Scholarship, and Heritage Endowments for the 2022 year. The endowments receive their year-end reports towards the end of January. Going forward, the Finance Team said that the November totals for the endowments will be used for the Annual Report so the information can be included in the formal Annual Report
- Jerald Oakes/Property Team has a bid for concrete work for the elevator entrance, but this project will be put on hold due to fixing the steeple.
- Two bids have been received for work on the steeple (\$92,000 and \$80,500).
- The Staffing Team will be doing staff evaluations May 2-10.
- Stewardship Team noted that Trinity has 240 giving units. Team lead, Lenny Myrah, said if all giving units increase by 1%, Trinity would be in good shape.
- Worship Team will be going through décor to see what to keep and what to recycle.

- First round of windows is complete. They will be doing the storm windows next.

#### MAY 10, 2023 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- The Care Team received \$1,000 from county commissioner for food shelf and a \$500 donation toward Christmas Cheer.
- The Communications Team posted 10 signs of affirmation around town to spread God's love. Will be putting out a new sign each week.
- The Outreach Team has been brainstorming having a New Member Sunday. Looking at the newly baptized. They asked that others let the Outreach Team know of new people attending church.
- The Finance Team recommends to contract with Tri-State Business Machines for a new contract for a printer for the office. It would be an annual contract so that overprinting would be calculated once a year instead of every month which should prevent overage fees. The cost of the new contract is \$100 less per month.
- Stained Glass Window Project update: They are here currently working on the windows. It will take 3 weeks to finish. Clean up inside the window panes. 2 coats of paint to the windowsills. Install new storm windows.

#### Motions passed:

- to repair the boiler at the Trinity Center for \$4,000 to \$5,000
- to enter into a new lease (60 months) with Tri-State Business Machines for a Canon IR ADV C756i II for office use with a cost per B&W copy of \$.007 and color copy of \$.06.
- to repair the steeple with Jason Crawly (Coon Valley, WI) for \$80.5K. A Special Congregation Meeting will be Sunday, June 11, 2023.

#### **WELCA NEWS**

Our WELCA ladies once again have been busy putting different kits together for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). During the winter months several gals have been meeting the last Friday of the month for Love Day. During this time making quilts is the main focus. Throughout the winter different supplies have been collected for Baby Care Kits, School Bags, and Personal Care Kits. Mary Deters leads us with organizing the supplies and when we have accumulated enough



individual items we have a day to assemble the kits. Judy Bratland puts her time to good use collecting the supplies for the school bags and then puts these supplies into a nylon school bag. On May 6, 2023, we were able to load all the boxes and take them to Decorah where about 15 volunteers unloaded our pick-up truck and suburban into a semitrailer which then would haul them to a warehouse where the boxes stay until loaded onto shipping containers. The generosity of many provided 31 quilts, 104 school bags, 88 personal care kits, 94 baby care kits and 4 fabric kits. WELCA would like to thank everyone for their contributions to this worthy cause.



#### ART AS PRAYER: SACRED CIRCLES

Many of us find ourselves surrounded by the pace of life, always on the lookout for the next thing we have to do. We fill in gaps on our calendars with yet another thing. Some of this comes from the voices in our heads that say to be successful, we assume busyness must be in the instruction manual. Busyness then becomes an addiction that consumes us, controlling everything from our workday calendars to our kid's extracurricular activities.

For us, as the church, can we recognize that there is no urgency to do anything in the church other than to proclaim God's amazing grace – the only urgency is the urgency of grace.

On June 8, we invite you to pause with us and join in Art as Prayer, Sacred Circles: The Shape of God.

Life is a sacred circle. When we gather in a circle, the praying has already begun. The symbolism of the circle is one of the oldest in North America. As a symbol of life, it is found in nearly all Native American tribes. It may also represent self, life, earth, the seasons, the sun, and the cosmos. Similarly, the Sanskrit word for circle (rooted in Buddhism) is mandala. Mandalas are designed to bring about inner focus and peace. The ultimate goal of painting spiritual compositions in the form of a circle or mandala is the achievement of wholeness.

Together, we will explore the beauty of painting a sacred circle as prayer practice. No painting experience is necessary. The desire to open your heart to the joyful voice of the Spirit is all you'll need.

Mary Thompson will guide the class. She is a regional artist, who has taught Art as Prayer at the Franciscan Spirituality Center in La Crosse for several years. We are so grateful she is able to share this experience with us.

# A Letter From Pastor Corrine Haulotte

"There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." -Galatians 3:28

At our student leader training retreat in August, I asked those gathered what they'd like our "focus theme" to be for the year. We'd already talked about how God's abundant love is felt, not just talked about at the LCC and how faith is at your own pace. They were were primed and chose "commUNITY," emphasis (obviously) on the unity.

Admittedly, this is the 3rd, or 4th year that our leaders chose something along the lines of "community," which I think says something about how the pandemic was for us. College students especially yearned for community in periods of isolation, distancing, masks, and stress. For those graduating in 2023, this was their first full "normal" year of college; (remember, they began in 2019-20!) They were eager, I think, to seek out unity, or wholeness. So often I hear students say they can bring their whole selves to the LCC.

When one student was asked by his partner, "Why do you bother with religion and the whole God thing?" he replied, "I know I could get love and find love in so many other places. And, I do, like in my family and friends. But, this is the one place that doesn't require anything of me first. I'm just loved.

No matter what." We talked about how often we can forget that when we're bombarded by messages of "not enough" every day. Which is why we keep coming back to this community— to be reminded of who and whose we are.



I've witnessed this student take that love he feels and share it all over the place. He brings friends to get coffee, handing out LCC bookmarks, showing them the chalkboard we decorate with encouraging messages, helping others to experience the safe and loving community of the LCC. He invites people to events. He sends out our weekly emails, and, as I told my mom recently, "keeps spinning gold." In fact, here's what he wrote recently: "I know I'm being long-winded, and maybe what I've just typed makes no sense, but know that it all boils down to this: You will question, and you will wander, and all the same, you will be loved."

Dear ones, I cannot thank you enough for continuing to support our community of faith. I truly can't believe I get to do this work, and I want you to know how much it means to me that you are a part of itevery day. May you, too, remember that "all the same, you will be loved by Jesus."



What is the synod?

The Southeastern Minnesota Synod is a faith community of over 117,000 baptized people in 165 congregations. It is one of the 65 synods that make up the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The synod includes two synod-authorized worshipping communities, two campus ministries, one camp, and many South Sudanese worshippers.

Synod means "to walk together." The three expressions of the ELCA are congregations and specialized ministries, synods, and the churchwide organization. Of the nine regions, the



Southeastern Minnesota Synod is part of region 3. The synod consists of congregations, groups, leaders, and members. Our domestic partner synod is the New England Synod. Our global partners include Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO), Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania - Central Diocese (ELCT-CD), and Evangelical Lutheran Church of Africa – Mission in South Sudan (ELCA-MSS).

# The mission of our synod: To walk together proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ.

## The Five Conferences:

This synod is divided into five conferences: Blue Earth River, Cannon River, Minnesota River, Root River, and Zumbro River. Each serves to cultivate relationships between congregations, provide a community for ministry leaders, select representatives to synod boards and **CANNON RIVER** committees, and create workgroups in alignment with the Goodhue Wabasha mission of the synod. Each holds monthly meetings and annual conference assemblies. Officers are also elected MINNESOTA RIVER ZUMBRO RIVER to represent each conference. I have been learning a lot about trees. Maybe these are things you already know, but just in case, I will share them with you.

Oak trees develop their taproots first. The taproot grows deep into the soil so that the sapling can access water even in a season of drought. Once the taproot is established, the oak grows lateral roots. Lateral roots are not as deep, but they reach outwards, sometimes up to 90 feet, and create a wide support base. The oak tree needs both types of roots to thrive.

Forests create networks of connection and support underground. Through their underground networks, the oldest trees in a forest provide nourishment and stability for the youngest trees.<sup>ii</sup> The whole forest flourishes only when the trees are connected and equally invested in both their health and the health of the whole.

I have been learning a lot about trees and how the ecosystem of a forest might have lessons to teach. It is essential for an oak tree to first establish its taproot's depth, and once that is done, it is just as crucial for its roots to extend out. Young trees depend on the strength and gifts of "mother trees" for their own nourishment and life.

In Psalm 1, the psalmist writes,

Happy are those who do not follow the advice of the wicked, or take the path that sinners tread, but their delight is in the law of the Lord, and on God's law they meditate day and night. They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season, and their leaves do not wither. In all that they do, they prosper.

About a year ago, as I approached the midpoint mark in this first term as bishop, a mentor asked me, "What do you hope to focus on in this season?" I told him I wanted to remind our congregations (you!) that you are part of a whole network of congregations (a synod). And that this connection to one another makes us all better. We are made better not for ourselves but for the sake of the gospel in the world.

As we make our way out of a season of intense isolation, it is important to remember we are not alone as individuals or congregations. Each and every one of us has been called to share

in the ministry of Christ Jesus our Lord.<sup>iii</sup> Each and every one of us is a member of the *one* body of Christ.

We each have a role in the ministry of the whole synod as individuals and congregations. Each congregation's ministry can be fortified and strengthened by the ministry and presence of the congregations around it.

That's why I've been thinking so much about trees. Trees, it seems, know this. Trees know their livelihoods depend on deep *and* wide roots.

We each need a deep taproot, something solid and solitary, rooted in Christ and our communities. We each need a lateral root system, too. This fibrous outreach to other individuals, communities, and congregations connects us to one another.

When we are deeply rooted in Christ and connected in community, we have all that we need to flourish, like trees planted by streams of water.


