

Thanks also to the Staffing Team (Betty Dokken, Nancy Gulbranson, John Halverson, and Danielle Myhre) for their work to recruit a new CYF Director. I am so incredibly grateful! Please thank these folks when you see them. Then, thank them again!

These volunteer efforts are not a long-term solution for our Children, Youth, and Family ministry needs and wants. We will continue to look for a new CYF Director. But we will also explore other staffing opportunities.


REJOICE RESPOND

December 7, 2023, marks 130 years since Trinity Lutheran Church was dedicated. The first brick church was dedicated on July 11, 1877. On April 3, 1893 a building near where the old creamery stands caught fire and a strong northwest wind blew ashes from that fire to the church causing a fire, which destroyed the church. Three days after the fire the congregation met and decided to rebuild, and eight months later, on December 7, 1893, our current church was dedicated. I'll leave it to your imagination to consider the dedication and determination of those early pioneers who cleaned up the debris from the ruins and from those ruins built a new church in which we worship today. December 7, 1893, was on a Thursday and ironically December 7 this year is also on a Thursday. One hundred and thirty years ago was a cold, snowy day with blustery winds from the northeast. By noon the church was filled with people still arriving for the dedication ceremonies.

Things have changed a lot from December 1893. One hundred and thirty years of use creates a lot of wear and tear. The stained glass windows on the south side have been restored. Soon you'll see new shingles being put on the steeple along with the stained glass windows on the west being restored. Our ministry and mission continue along with the expense of providing for our ministry.

As members of Trinity we should continually examine our time and talents finding ways to help and enhance our ministry. Let us give thanks to the memory of our forbears in establishing Trinity and its ministry, which continues to this day.

HERE IS THE CHURCH, HERE IS THE STEEPLE....

As many of you know the steeple on our church is in need of repair. Thank you to our Property Team for finding someone who will do this work for us. This is no small task. Our current steeple was completed and dedicated on December 7, 1893. The current steeple was 50 feet shorter than the old one, but it still is about 100 feet tall. Can you imagine what it will take to get up that steep incline to replace the materials that are loosening? It will be an interesting thing to watch. We are so blessed that the funds for this project are secured and it is our hope that work will start this fall.

But as you look at the current steeple, do you see those copper gable ornaments going around the structure, accenting the edges of the area where the steeple roof meets the brick? You will notice one on each corner and an additional three on each side. These ornaments were not included in the original bid for repair, but the company doing the work can replace these as well. The cost for doing this is around \$10,000.

We are launching a campaign to raise the funds to pay for this work. The plans are to have a QR code that will be found in the weekly bulletin, the newsletter, our website, etc. This will link you to where you are able to commit to donating to the project. We also hope to post some YouTube videos on our website that will give you some additional information about the history of the steeple and more about the project.

We encourage you to walk to the front of the church and look up into the heavens. Notice the steeple. It is something you can see when you enter town from any direction. We have a heritage of ancestors who put their faith in God and looked to building a structure where they could worship, and they believed it would be around for many

generations. We are thankful for their foresight and to yours for your continued commitment to maintaining our beautiful structure.

SEPTEMBER 13, 2023 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS Updates:

- Care Ministry Team received \$500 from synod for Food Pantry
- Education Team has divided some of the duties that Kerri did.
- Lorilyn Dehning (Finance Team member) did a wage comparison to gain information to the cost of having two pastors versus one full time Pastor, ½ time Pastor and a CYF Director. The Finance Team will review the report.
- Property Team is working on a 10-year plan.
- Stewardship Team would like to do a brochure to share the history of the church. Dec. 7 is 130 years of the dedication of the church they would like to have a celebration. More to come.
- Trinity Center/Release Time Committee update much has changed since the Annual Meeting. The committee shared many ideas some are staff dependent. They are looking for more direction council advised to get the facts out present to congregation at the Annual Meeting. The committee will plan to meet one more time.
- Kerri's resignation was presented, position has been advertised in 20 churches, 3 colleges, 3 newspapers.

Motions passed:

- to allow AA to meet at Trinity Center Tues. evenings and Sat. mornings and pay for a key box to be installed.
- to have a fundraiser by a mailing to raise \$10,000 to get the final funds for the steeple project
- to use Castle Grey Slate for the steeple roof
- to add Jean Ann Tweeten as signer to Luther League account
- to renew Portico Benefits for Pastor Elizabeth and for a new CYF director (when hired) with Silver+, HSA Level A plan for 2024 same benefits as 2023 with increase cost
- to send the \$6,000 ERC first fruits dollars to Lutheran Disaster Response Maui Fires and Florida Hurricane to be divided equally between the two

OCTOBER 11, 2023 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS Updates:

- Care Team reported that our Little Free Pantry is being used very well. There have been more concerns with mischief. This is happening due to the Food Shelf being accessible 24 hours. Looking into having select hours.
- Communications Team said the Intergenerational campfire and wiener roast was a great time. Planning to have this intergenerational time again. Looking at having this once a month on a Sunday afternoon/evening.
- Education Team said they are still looking for a Wednesday Bible School leader and for someone to lead the Children's Christmas Program.
- Finance Team set Annual Meeting for Feb. 4, 2024. Audit date on all church accounts will be Jan. 21, 2024.
- Finance Team voted in favor of disposing of financial support information more than 7 years old, keeping all Annual Reports found.
- Staffing Team is going over wages for staffing for 2024. Two people have been interested and interviewed for the CYF position, but neither followed up with applications; extended the search to 9 colleges until Dec. 31, 2023.
- Stewardship Team is working on the 130th Anniversary of the Dedication of Trinity Church Dec. 7, 1893. Would like the celebration on Dec. 10, 2023 with Norwegian treats. Communications and Worship Teams will help with preparation for the celebration.
- Master Planning Committee update passed around picture of proposed addition (4,000 square feet). They have one more session with the architects.
- Trinity Center/Release Time Committee update 121 students signed up for Release Time. There are no volunteers helping with Release Time it's just Pr. Len Liptack and Pr. Elizabeth.
- Adding a gravel parking lot by Trinity Center allowing for 10-12 parking spots was discussed. Estimate cost would be \$1,000 to install a sidewalk. Discussion followed with concerns that a building permit may be needed. They will check with the city. Trinity Center property shares an easement with Terry Sagdalen. They will also talk with Terry to see how he feels about the possibility of increased traffic.
- Sabbatical update Lane Zaffke. will do this for ³/₄ the salary.

Motions passed:

- to pay Pr. Lane \$30/hour for his work organizing our youth to attend the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans July 16-20, 2024.
- to approve 2 fundraisers: Bag-A-Buck Special Offering for Little Free Pantry and Christmas Cheer to designate Thanksgiving Offering to Christmas Cheer Bags



THE HALLS OF TRINITY CENTER ARE RINGING WITH THE SOUND OF RELEASE TIME STUDENTS

Thanks to Gary Wilhelmson, Lee Hoekstra, Rick Sundet, and David Eiken, the boiler and bathrooms at Trinity Center are working again. Thanks to Lori Wilhelmson, the former Beary Patch room has been painted and decorated for our Release Time program. Thanks also to Heather Gray and the Release Time/Trinity Center Committee for their work exploring the program's history and Trinity Center opportunities. (By the way, you know a bathroom has been significantly improved when a fifth-grade boy comments on it.)

This year, 125 Kindergarten to sixth graders are attending Release Time in ten different sessions on Wednesdays throughout each month. Pr. Len Liptack, Pastor of Faith of Black Hammer, is teaching them about the Lord's Prayer. Pr. Elizabeth has been leading the kids in song and providing an activity. Pr. Lane is also helping.

The first lesson of the year was about the first petition of the Lord's Prayer: "Our Father in Heaven, Hallowed Be Thy Name." Pr. Len explained that "hallowed" means "special." He also talked about different kinds of fathers. The kids sang "I've got the joy, joy, joy down in my heart." After the lesson, they drew pictures of what "Heaven" looks like. You'd be surprised how many kids picture Heaven as God driving a green tractor! But also a lot of rainbows!

Other groups enjoying the use of Trinity Center are AA and the Cub Scouts, as well as a mental health counselor who offers free counseling on Thursdays. The school is still storing some items in the big room downstairs. They will evaluate their needs at the end of the year. For now, the Congregation Council has voted not to allow other groups to rent or use space at Trinity Center until we've determined our long-term usage of the building.

Deer hunting season opens in Minnesota November 4 and here at Trinity we will Bag-A-Buck for Little Free Pantry. On Sunday, November 5, we will conduct a second collection during the service. We encourage everyone to put a "buck" (or any amount) into the special offering collection. Checks can be made out to Trinity with Little Free Pantry on the memo line.

Note: Ninth grade Confirmation students, Kya Deck and Hayden St. Mary, interviewed Nola Nackerud for their Confirmation project and wrote the below article.

MISSIONARY FOR A DAY: NOLA NACKERUD

Nola Nackerud (Ekern) is a 72 year old deaf interpreter teacher living in Nicaragua. Nola was born and

raised in Spring Grove, and after graduating high school, she went on to learn at Luther College, then went to the University of Montana to get her masters degree in Psychology. She then went on to get a degree in ASL interpreting in Atlanta, GA. However, when she went to Nicaragua, she had to learn a new sign language. Some words are very different, but some are similar. After getting a divorce with her husband, she realized she cannot stay feeling sad about it, and that she should go to help others.

So, in 2001, she went to Nicaragua as a peace volunteer. She also volunteered to help with translating in hospitals and other places. Since she was not earning money from any of this, she sold many of her belongings back home so that she had money for food and a home in Nicaragua. While she was volunteering, she worked in rural schools and did projects relating to environmental issues. In 2007, at the end of her volunteering, she was offered a job in Codega. To this day, she is still doing work in Codega, and loving every bit of it.



"Every day is different," says NoIa. Some days she visits very rural schools that she may have to walk for hours to get to, while other days she may be able to take a bus there,



with just a bit of walking. Although, at the end of the day when she is done teaching, those buses may not be available to give her a ride back. Some days she was able to ride a horse to work! The schools she works at generally have their school year going from February to November. Kids graduate at a much younger age, and then go on to a university. Nola will also visit the homes of families in need, and she helps children find schools that can fit their needs. Nola makes sure to show these kids lots of love, and give them many compliments. She wants to make sure they feel iimportant. She has even helped and inspired one of her students to become an ASL teacher.

Nola loves life in Nicaragua; "it's very relaxed." She says that all the people in Nicaragua have lots of faith in God, and thank Him every day with the words "gracias adios" basically meaning that they thank God and hope he blesses who they are speaking with. She loves how eager children that are able to hear are to learn sign language. When she teaches some classes

that do not have hearing difficulties, she will reward their good behavior by teaching them some sign language, and they love it.

Life is very different between Nicaragua and the United States. Some of the main differences between living is there are no vehicles, no fast food restaurants, or microwaveable food. Poverty is very common, so people do not waste food at all. Popular foods are rice, beans, tomatoes, green peppers, eggs, and onions. The food is mainly cooked over fires because of the lack of electricity in homes. Coffee is massively produced, and many kids start drinking it at a young age. Sometimes kids cannot afford school supplies, so she will use some school supplies sent to her, or donations, to help these families. Another difference is that schools do not always have bathrooms, and if they do they are outdoor restrooms. Their culture is very faithful and birthdays are a very big celebration. Many houses there are made of mud or have tin roofs.

Nola has been chosen to be our missionary for a day. What does this mean exactly? This means that there is a candle at the front of the church, and you can pay money for the acolytes that Sunday to light it to honor you and your family. This money you are paying goes to Nola to support her students in need. She will use this money for students that cannot afford school supplies and other students in need.

BEATING BURNOUT: 8 STEPS TO REJUVENATING CHURCH VOLUNTEERS

While burnout of rostered ministers post-pandemic (and before) has been widely acknowledged, burnout of active members of congregations is also being felt. As congregations ramp up programs after a summer respite, there are ways to recognize the weariness and lift up the ministry of the people.

1. People are tired. Say that.

Fewer people attend worship than in the past, but tasks still need to be done. Since congregations began resuming in-person ministry, fewer people have been willing to participate. Some people fear being exposed to COVID or made life changes during the pandemic.

Congregation members also might be experiencing fatigue because they're so busy doing the work of the church that they aren't experiencing the church. "There's a diminished number of people doing more and more stuff," Phil Gustafson, a retired pastor, said. "You don't have time to just be at church and worship and be replenished. It's OK to say that."

2. Recognize that the pandemic brought layers of grief.

Among the losses experienced by people "is that we are never going to be the church we were pre-pandemic," said Chon Pugh, pastor of Memorial Lutheran and First Presbyterian Church in Texas City, Texas. "It's a loss. You're grieving that. We are a grieving church right now."

"We're never going to be what we were in the '80s or the '90s. That's just not going to happen," she said. Pugh said she's had three council members ask to step down because of the weariness of loss and change. "You just get tired," she said. "Even if it's just one night a week, it's that one night a week."

Pugh suggests finding ways to acknowledge the loss. "Have a campfire, write down the losses, put it in the campfire," she said. "Name it."

3. Do we have to do this?

Gustafson asks two questions: Is what we're doing honoring God? Is what we're doing building up the body of Christ? "If it's not doing those two things," he added, "why are we doing it?" Sometimes people need to be given permission to end an activity or ministry. "Just because it's always been done doesn't mean it has to continue if there aren't people passionate about it," she said.

In this hybrid world, Gustafson said that it's also OK to question continuing certain ministries, especially when there's a longing to go back to what used to be. "It's a curse when I'm doing something at church because my mother did it and my father did it and my cousin twice removed did it," he said. "Is [the ministry] still something that works? How can we make this for the 21st century and less the 1950s?"

There are ways to recognize the weariness and lift up the ministry of the people.

4. Help people weather criticism.

It's an age-old problem: active church members feeling hurt because other parishioners are critical when a project has glitches or something doesn't go according to plan.

It's important to be aware when that sort of public criticism is taking place and help provide tools and support for people to weather those storms.

5. Shower workers with thanks.

The list of active church members might be long or short. Thank them. Thank them again.

Be intentional about "speaking to the half-full part of it rather than the half-empty part of it."

6. Simon sees. Simon says. Simon does.

"Focus on your own spirituality," says Gustafson. "You can be so busy doing things that you're not being spiritual. You pray, but you don't engage in prayer for yourself. Or meditate. Or find a way to center."

There comes a time when we need to let go. And then we can pick up again." Pastors tend to overwork and burn out because they think they have to do it all. "Letting go of that mentality has been exceptionally hard for pastors, given the professional model, because they feel called to do the work. We get sucked in," he said. "But you can't help anyone else unless you put the oxygen mask on yourself."

7. Lift up and nurture future leaders.

Raising up new leaders might have occurred more naturally in the past, but now that needs to be a more intentional focus.

Any communication with members of the congregation is important. A quick text lets someone know that you're thinking about them.

8. Communicate, communicate, communicate.

When people know they are valued they will give their best: The power of thank-you is an answer to burnout.

Any communication with members of the congregation is important. A quick text lets someone know that you're thinking about them. An email or a phone call can link rostered ministers to people. Or you can go old-school and send a card.
