



- We will continue to host small family funerals in the sanctuary, with no visitation or fellowship. It is very important that COVID guidelines regarding masks and distancing be maintained at funerals.
- The AA group will continue to meet on Tuesdays and Saturdays to accommodate this crucial ministry during this time.
- The Cub Scouts will meet Tuesday afternoons when it's too cold to meet outdoors.

- Attend our Ash Wednesday Virtual Service on Wednesday, February 17: Drive-Through Communion and Imposition of Ashes at 6 p.m. and worship on Facebook Live at 7 p.m.

Beloved family of God,

It has seemed like a lifetime since we were able to worship together, sing together, gather for fellowship, and celebrate fully the festivals and seasons of the church and members lost to death. And we are, indeed, approaching a year since we sang to one-another at the close of worship on March 15, 2020.


The prophet Jeremiah wrote the above words to the Israelites during their 70-years-long exile away from the Promised Land. Conquered by the Babylonians more than 2500 years ago, the Israelites were torn from their homes, driven to a foreign land, enslaved, and not able to worship in their temple. For God's chosen people, it really was a lifetime.

But God's promises are always sure. God always promises "hope and a future." That is no less true for us today than it was for the Israelites all those years ago. And we are no less God's chosen people than the ancient Israelites.

I wonder, sometimes, about the stories they told one-another after the exile had ended and they could return home. I can imagine the questions children and grandchildren might have asked: "What did

you do during the exile, grandma?" "How did you worship?" 'How did you take care of one-another?"

One thing I'm certain of, they didn't have Zoom or Facebook or a radio!



Believe the promise.

1 Samuel 3:1 "Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread."

Even the Bible records how God is sometimes silent. This passage happens after a long silence. What has happened to God's Chosen people? Have they grown complacent? Do they take their belief that God chose them for granted? Have they turned their backs on God? The answer seems to be yes in this case. As the passage continues, Samuel eventually answers God.

Samuel is a boy ministering to Eli, a priest. Samuel's mother, Hannah, had been barren but miraculously bore him in her old age (this happens a few times in the Old Testament). He is chosen by God as a prophet for the purpose of bringing the people of Israel back to faith and righteousness.

Frederick Buechner writes about the angel Gabriel anxiously waiting as Mary decides whether she will submit to God's will and birth the Christ Child. In writing it, Buechner speculates that the Angel had asked many other young women the same question only to be turned down. Now that is something to mull over. Has God tried talking to us? And what did we answer, if we did at all.

THE 2020 TRINITY ANNUAL MEETING ON ZOOM WAS A GREAT SUCCESS!

Thank you to the 72 voting members who logged on or called in to the 2020 Trinity Annual Meeting on Zoom last Sunday, January 31, at 11 a.m. Eligible voting members of the congregation number just under 500, so a quorum of 50 (10%) was surpassed for the meeting to be called to order.

After attendance was taken – a slightly lengthier process to ensure accuracy on Zoom – Pr. Elizabeth opened the meeting with a prayer and litany. The previous annual meeting minutes were then approved, followed by acceptance of the financial reports and the pastor's remarks.

All three agenda items – the 2021 budget, changes to the Constitution, and the 2021 ballot – were voted on and approved. Procedures were in place to ensure all those wishing to vote anonymously could do so. The budget and ballot required a simple majority vote, while the changes to the Constitution required a two-thirds majority.

Pr. Elizabeth closed with a prayer and benediction and the meeting was adjourned, after which new and returning team members were installed and blessed with a prayer.

Special thanks to Bookkeeper Lorilyn Dehning, Treasurer Barb Arnold, and the Finance Team for putting the budget together, and to Constitution Committee members Saundy Solum, Jacque Wennes, Lee Hoekstra, and Mary Deters. Special thanks also to the Nominating Committee: Outgoing Care Team Lead and Council Vice President Milly Halverson, Jessi Strinmoen, Willy Leafblad, Jacque Wennes, and Lori Wilhelmson.

Special thanks and credit for a successful meeting go to Congregation President Saundy Solum, who led the meeting, and CYF Director Bekah Leafblad and managed technical, attendance and voting great thanks go to Marlene Deschler for

preparing the Annual Report, setting up the secure web page, and preparing the meeting mailing.

SOCK DRIVE

The Outreach Team's Sock Drive continues through February 28. Socks have been identified as a significant need within our region. Socks are frequently the most requested, but least donated, items at homeless shelters. Locally socks will be available at Trinity's Little Free Pantry, and area schools. They will also be distributed to regional homeless shelters in La Crosse, Winona, Rochester, and the Twin Cities.

What's needed: all types (crew, no-show, wool, athletic, etc.) and all sizes (men, women, children, baby).

How you can help:

JANUARY 13, 2021 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- The Outreach Team helped Meals on Wheels deliver meals for Christmas Eve and Day. 56 people received meal packages. There were \$1,200 in donations. A hot, ready-to-eat meal from Ivy Grove was delivered on Christmas Eve along with a cold meal from Red's to heat for Christmas Day. Care packages and cards were put together by members of community and were delivered along with the meals.
- Currently, there are four 9th and 10th grade youth signed up for the houseboat trip this summer, The Education Team decided to open up the trip to 8th graders to hopefully fill the remaining 6 spots (10 total).
- Facility Plan Team has not met. Plan to meet next week on Tuesday, Jan. 19 at 5:30 pm via Zoom and socially distanced at church. A donor has generously given \$500,000 to the building fund. A finance/fundraising team should be assigned for this project, including a person from the Finance Team.
- The Scholarship Endowment received a generous gift of \$100,000.
- Trinity Center update a camera door lock/doorbell system was installed. Trinity Center is locked 24/7. Press doorbell and Bethany (Beary Patch teacher) can unlock from the inside. Key cards have been distributed to those that need to regularly enter the building. A picture is also taken of those at door. All at a cost of \$1.100.
- Pr. Elizabeth discussed security discussions at Trinity. The Council discussed locking/not locking the church for safety. Chief Foltz suggested that we lock the church. Barbara Arnold moved that the church be locked, Willy Leafblad seconded it. There was more discussion. The motion was tabled.
- Facebook Live for funerals Do we want to charge for usage of FB live at funerals? Council agreed to charge a \$10 fee. Willy will discuss with Worship Team for funeral policy modifications.

Motions passed:

- Banking authority correct people need to be on the bank's list. Finance Team lead, Judy Tollefsrud, needs to be added.
- Event fundraising form to add a note for special circumstances to the form to be approved by pastor and council president and team lead, if needed, prior to next council meeting or 2 months' timeframe.

Next Meeting: February 10 at 7:00 p.m. via Zoom. Complete minutes are on Trinity's website.





Staffing decisions will be informed by the strategic thinking of board and staff, she said. Over the next several months, additional information will also become available to assist in making those staffing decisions, such as 1) actual revenue received in FY2020, 2) the pandemic trajectory and 3) revenue received in quarters one and two of FY2021.

In other actions, the board

 Amended an investment policy adopted at its regularly scheduled meeting on Oct. 24, 2020, that will allow the entire executive board to decide where gifts over \$25,000 are distributed.

With giving down, organization forced into staffing changes

WITH GIVING TO THE ORGANIZATION DOWN SIGNIFICANTLY, Women of the ELCA's executive board adopted a 2021 budget that will change the staff configuration. The new staffing model was announced December 16. Eight of 10 on staff will move to part-time positions Feb. 1, and two will remain full time.

Executive Director Linda Post Bushkofsky and *Gather* Editor Elizabeth Hunter will keep their full-time jobs. The remaining eight positions will go part time, with seven of those positions guaranteed through the end of August 2021. See those positions here: https://www.womenoftheelca.org/about/staff.

The board, in a special meeting Dec. 5, approved a 2021 budget of \$1,636,250 or \$729,750 (31 percent) less than the 2020 budget of \$2,366,000.

"We are recommending a budget best suited for our finances given the pandemic and the reduction in income we've been receiving year after year," said Sara Larson, chairman of the churchwide budget and finance committee.

"For many years, we have been trying to get by and making ways for there not to be staff cuts," she added. "However, we cannot continue to operate in this manner. We have to come up with a new plan."



In announcing the new staffing model, Bushkofsky said, "I see the time between January and August as allowing focused strategic thinking about how the organization will meet its mission in the future and what staffing arrangement will best serve the organization into that future. That strategic thinking will build upon the strategic planning work already accomplished by the churchwide executive board during the 2017–2020 triennium."

"What staffing will look like come September 1, 2021, is unknown, beyond the work of the executive director, editor of *Gather* and managing editor of *Gather*," Bushkofsky said.

- Approved a recently received bequest of \$152,000 to be distributed "where needed most."
- Authorized the executive director and board treasurer to open a bank account at BMOHarris for general operating purposes and an account at Edward Jones for the recent \$152,00 bequest.
- Heard an informational update on the status of the triennial convention and gathering, currently postponed until August 2021 as in-person events in Phoenix, Arizona. (See page 8 for an updated decision about dates for the convention and gathering.)

Our letter-exchange project is so popular, we've extended it

"DEAR FRIEND IN CHRIST, our letterexchange project, has proven so popular that it's been extended to March 5, 2021," said Linda Post Bushkofsky, executive director. "Women throughout the ELCA have written letters, sharing their faith, offering advice on coping through the pandemic, even exchanging poems and recipes.



"The project's success coupled with the most challenging days ahead in the coronavirus pandemic suggested we should extend Dear Friend in Christ into the new year," she explained. "Maintaining community through Thanksgiving, Christmas and into the New Year, all at a time of physical distancing, is critically important."

Women who have already exchanged letters in the project are encouraged to exchange cards and continue writing into 2021, sustaining community, and lifting spirits. Those who are new to the project are invited to do the same.

It's easy to participate in the Dear Friend in Christ project. You simply write a letter, complete the release form, and mail it to the address provided on the form. Soon thereafter, you will receive a letter and the author of that letter will receive your letter. Visit <u>welca.org/dearfriend</u> to learn how to send and receive a letter.

Don't forget the release form

"We have encountered a dilemma with some letters," Bushkofsky said. "Some women have not included a release form, and some have not included any information about themselves, no name, not even a return mailing address. If we at least had their mailing address, we could write to them, provide a release form, and ask them to complete the form."

That explains why some women have sent in letters but not received any in return.

A signed release form is required. If a woman knows she did not include a release form, she can complete one and mail it in so that an exchange can take place.

Project ends March 5, 2021

"We selected a new end date of March 5, 2021, so women might consider a letter writing effort when they observe Bold Women's Day on February 28. By March 5 we should also be seeing some encouraging signs of spring," said Bushkofsky.

WHAT IS MEDICARE CERTIFIED HOME CARE PROGRAM? HOW COULD WE HELP YOU?

Our Medicare Certified Home Care is as it states, we are certified through Medicare. How can you qualify for our Program? The Criteria is that you are **Homebound** and need a **Skilled Service**.

• Homebound, means it is difficult for you to leave your home, down step, into a car, etc. Usually a person who is homebound uses a walker or a cane. You may have post-surgery restrictions or are weak from a recent hospitalization or have dementia. Being homebound has nothing to do with being able to drive and it is not a choice. A person would need to think twice about going anywhere because it is so much work. This does not mean that you can never leave your home during this period of Coverage.

What you CAN do: **Someone** can take you to doctor's appointments, **Someone** can take you to Church, and **Someone** can take you to a hair appointment or a special family event. However, if you are able to hop in the car and go to Walmart with your daughter and get groceries, you probably are not homebound and would not qualify. However, during this pandemic, people could be homebound because of Covid restriction.

• Skilled Services: There must be a need and you would benefit from one of 3 skilled services: A Skilled Nurse, a Physical Therapist or a Speech Therapist. We need a doctor's order for the Skilled Service. It will be ordered by your primary care physician. A Registered Nurse would complete an assessment to determine if an individual would qualify, and what Skilled Services would be beneficial to the individual and Goals would be discussed.

Progress would be documented to show improvement to meet those Goals. When individual's goals are met they are discharged from the program. Because of the improvement, you are able to get back to your normal life and routine.

Good Samaritan Society Home Care will bill Medicare on your behalf and all services are usually paid 100%. We also accept Medicare HMO's (that may have deductible and copay), VA, private insurance and private pay.


