

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Valentine's Day means love of all kinds

Valentine's Day occurs every February 14. People around the world celebrate by exchanging greeting cards, candy, flowers, and gifts between loved ones. Christians honor Saint Valentine, who some say was a Roman Priest who performed secret weddings for soldiers forbidden to marry by the Roman Emperor Claudius II. Saint Valentine wore a ring with a Cupid on it—a Roman symbol of love—that helped soldiers to recognize him. He also handed out paper hearts to remind Christians of their love for God. Saint Valentine was executed by the Emperor on 14 February 269 AD for not renouncing Christianity. Pope Gelasias I in 496 AD first established a Christian feast day to honor Saint Valentine. Today, Valentine's Day has become

a time for Christians to show care and love for one another and remember God's love.

Although the story of Valentine's Day is shrouded in mystery, we can bring some of the truth back. The truth is, love can't be squelched, outlawed, or stamped out. The significance of Valentine's life was not that he defended love and romance and performed secret marriages. The truth is, Valentine was in love with his Savior, Jesus Christ. Love for Jesus trumped his love of self. Valentine nobly gave his life for the God he loved.



That is true love. But true love is deeper still. It goes beyond our love for God. "In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atonement for our sins." John 3:16 defines love: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

This Valentine's day, do something different.... talk about true love—the love that God had for us. The love that sent Jesus to a cross. Talk about our love for Him—the kind of love that goes beyond mere comfortable Christian existence. The kind of love that is willing to take risks, to sacrifice everything, and even to give our lives for Him who loved us.

Ways to show love

- contact a shelter for those with housing insecurities and provide clean socks, underwear, shampoo, toothpaste, soap, etc.
- take care of an errand, task, chore for someone
- cook and deliver a meal to someone
- tell a loved one or friend what you specifically love about them
- leave encouraging post-it notes for a family member or co-worker
- buy coffee for the next person in line
- send letters of thanks to organizations that make a difference in the community, including the police department, the fire department, EMTs, etc.
- find somewhere to volunteer and do it together with a friend

Valentine's Day is a celebration of love—and not just the kind of love you see in movies, but a greater love for all humanity.

Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."' Genesis 12:1-3

Dear people of God.

Grace and peace to you from God our Father, and from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

But in the meantime, as I mentioned in my remarks on Sunday, I am so grateful for the worship, fellowship, education, care, and outreach we have accomplished. In many ways, we have extended our reach and God's message to an audience far beyond our borders. We have said "yes" to care for our neighbor in the form of our COVID protocols. We said "yes" to hiring Nicole Krenzke, Kerri Jahnke and Logan Olson. We said "yes" to sharing our abundance with our neighbors near and far.

The minutes from the Annual Meeting will be available soon and will include all the pertinent details. Here are the highlights:

Barb Arnold reported that we finished the year with offerings approximately \$12,000 above expenses. With that blessing, the Congregation Council voted to share a portion with Lutheran Disaster Response and with our Good Samaritan Fund.

Al Frydenlund presented a Mission and Ministry budget approximately equal to 2021's, which passed unanimously.

Milly Halverson presented the team ballot which also passed unanimously. We gave thanks for all those team members going off teams, and especially for the service of Barb Arnold (Treasurer), Jan Kraabel (Staffing Team Lead), and Lara Wold Mendez (Outreach Team Lead). We also give thanks for those who stepped forward to fill vacant spots, serve on next year's Nominating Committee, and attend the Root River Conference and Southeastern Minnesota Synod assemblies.


Mary Deters gave an update on the work of the Master Plan Committee, which will meet again on February 13. The meeting adjourned and new and returning team members were installed.

The chaplain is supposed to ask if the person is a member at a church. This doesn't always happen. Sometimes it doesn't get listed. And there are many other things that get in the way. I can't help feeling bad though when I find out someone was in the hospital for several days and the church doesn't get notified. Pastor Elizabeth and I would rather be told numerous times of someone in the hospital than not at all.



In the early church, when someone was sick the elders of the church would gather and lay hands on the person and pray for healing. Spiritual care is part of the healing process. Please help us do our jobs better by letting us know when someone is in or going to the hospital or if someone needs a home visit.

JANUARY 12, 2022 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

<u>Jpdates</u>:

- Communications Team will be calling members to update contact info, addresses, etc.
- Finance Team said financials in the Annual Report will not be the audited ones; those will be made available after the audit.
- A Master Planning Committee has been formed. Members are: Steve Kemp (lead), Eric Frydenlund, Bev Nelson, Barb Arnold, Aaron Solum, Mary Deters, Dana Kjome, and Dan Alstad.
- All team leads received the Gifts & Memorials brochure and were asked to give ideas of needs pertinent to their teams.
- Annual Meeting will be a hybrid... In-person and via Zoom. This will be the norm going forward so that as many members as possible may attend.
- Trinity is hosting the Root River Conference Assembly on February 20.
- Boiler at the Trinity Center needs replacing. It is quitting numerous times a day. Gary Wilhelmson and David Eiken check on it several times a day to make sure it is running and often to restart it.
- The west side front entrance will be closed during the winter due to ice build-up on the steps and winds opening the doors when they are unlocked.

Motions passed:

- For the Property Team to spend up to \$25,000 to replace the Trinity Center's boiler. \$7,000 comes from money left from tuckpointing and \$15,000 from the Olerud fund.
- To use tithing surplus in this way: through the ELCA Disaster Response \$1,000 for the Kentucky tornado fund and \$1,000 for the Colorado fire fund. \$500 for Kwik Trip gas cards to be given out through the Good Samaritan fund.

Next Meeting: February 9, 2022, at 7:00 p.m. Complete minutes are on Trinity's website.

MASTER PLAN COMMITTEE (MPC)

This committee evolved out of the Facilities Planning Committee. As the Facilities Planning Committee was working on an addition to the church building it became apparent that there were more updates needed in the building, thus the Master Plan Committee was formed to look at everything that already exists to see what repairs and updates need to be made. The MPC has already met and are making lists of what needs to be done, once these are all gathered they will be prioritized including how the building addition will fit into the plan. Their goal is to have this report done by the end of April. Congregation President Saundy Solum and Pastor Elizabeth Hermeier will serve as ex-officio members.



Support Affordable Housing and Homeless Funding

While legislators discuss funding levels in the Fiscal Year 2022 federal budget, it is a critical time to highlight the housing and homeless needs in our communities as housing costs for middle and low-income households continue to rise faster than ever. In past budget deals, housing programs have often seen the smallest increases when compared to other programs – making it a critical issue to bring to the attention of our lawmakers.

"Sharing key solutions and our unique faith-based perspectives with public partners is essential to ensure greater access to safe and affordable homes and putting an end to this housing crisis."

Passage of the The Freedom to Vote: John R. Lewis Act would be a key step in ensuring the voices of all citizens will be safeguarded and heard. Its provisions would help reinstate guidelines that ensure protection through oversight and combat voter suppression.

What Is Crisis Response and SERCC?

Crisis Response services are available for residents of Southeast Minnesota's 10-county region. Services provide a continuum of care for those experiencing a (self defined) mental health crisis and include community mobile response, the Southeast Regional Crisis Center (SERCC) with a clinic and short-term residential facilities, and stabilization after-care.

What Is the Continuum of Care?

The continuum of care is designed to provide individuals with options to address their needs during, throughout, and after their mental health crisis. The goal is to provide urgent mental health care in the least restrictive environment to help individuals safely remain or return quickly to their community setting. Services may include:

- · A screening conducted over the phone via the hotline.
- An in-person community assessment with the mobile response team, or walk in assessment with the SERCC clinic staff.
- Admission to SERCC's short-term residential unit if determined medically necessary by SERCC's qualified mental health professional.
- · Options for stabilization after-care up to 45 days.
- Bridging services that include therapy, psychiatry, diagnostic assessment, and referral connections. All clinic bridging services are short term and do not replace the need for long-term providers.

Who Can Access Crisis Response Services?

Services are available to any individual experiencing a self defined crisis who is willingly accepting services and can participate in their plan of care. Services are open to all residents of the 10-county region of southeast Minnesota, regardless of financial or insurance status (with no direct cost to the individual). Community mobile response, SERCC, and stabilization after-care services are available to individuals of all ages. SERCC's short-term residential is available to individuals ages 10+ for up to 10 days. Short-term residential and stabilization aftercare are available only through an assessment with community mobile response or at SERCC with a mental health practitioner or qualified mental health professional. Clinic bridging services are available through assessment at SERCC and determined as medically necessary by a qualified mental health professional.

Who Is a Good Fit for SERCC's Short-Term Residential?

At SERCC, a mental health crisis is defined by the individual seeking services and is a behavioral, emotional, or psychiatric situation that would likely result in significantly reduced levels of functioning. A mental health emergency is defined as a behavioral, emotional, or psychiatric situation causing an immediate need for mental health services. Most times, individuals requiring emergency services are best served at their local emergency department.

After an initial screening and a mental health assessment, the multidisciplinary team along with SERCC's qualified mental health professional team determines if short-term residential is medically necessary for the individual. In some cases an individual may not be admitted to short-term residential if deemed a safety risk. The following are some examples when an individual needs a higher level of care beyond what SERCC can provide:

- · risk of substance withdrawal
- active and/or current aggression
- · unwillingness/inability to participate in *programing
- suicidal plan with intent and access to means that can not be mitigated
- medical complications that require a higher level of care
- · risk of elopement

Each situation is assessed based on the individual's current mental health status and the ability to maintain their safety while in short-term residential. SERCC is a community based, trauma informed setting and restrictive procedures are not utilized. All providers and individuals are encouraged to reach out to us regarding your unique situation for individual assessment.

How Can Individuals Access Services?

- All services can be accessed by calling 1-844-274-7472.
- SERCC is a 24/7 walk-in clinic and no appointment is necessary. The center is located at 2121 Campus Drive, SE Rochester, MN.
- Individuals looking to access SERCC's short-term residential must first complete a mental health assessment and be identified as a safe and appropriate candidate by SERCC's multidisciplinary team along with the qualified mental health processional.

How Can Providers Make a Referral?

Providers can access services for clients in one of three ways.

- 1. The recommended way to make a referral is to call the hotline at 1-844-274-7472 on behalf of the individual. Identify you are a provider and request a direct transfer to your local community mobile response team. A community mobile response team has the ability to complete screening, assessment, intervention, and provide deescalation to help individuals safely remain in the community. Community mobile response teams can also provide referrals to short term residential or SERCC's clinic services when appropriate.

- Lastly, you can call SERCC directly at (507) 322-3019 and identify you are a provider.
