Dear people of God,

This Sunday marks the 504th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. It is also the day on which our 10th graders affirm their baptism, that is, their confirmation of faith. Each of these wonderful young people has completed three years of faith formation in which they studied the Bible, Luther's Small Catechism, and finally the Lutheran tradition of vocation.

These four remarkable young people (a small but mighty class) volunteered as acolytes and lectors; they wrote up numerous sermon notes; and they most recently completed projects: Our belfry is free of pigeons (and what pigeons leave behind) because of them. Two other thoughtful projects will be displayed on the altar on Sunday. It is a tribute to them that the COVID pandemic necessitated fully half of their education time be done via Zoom! It is also a tribute to their mentor, Karen Gray, that she guided them faithfully during these three years.

On Sunday, you will see their stoles, decorated by them to represent their faith and life. You'll hear the scripture they've chosen. And together with their family, friends and baptismal sponsors, you'll bless them and pray for them.

The text from Romans, above, was my confirmation verse. I've always loved Paul's letter to the churches in Rome. It's a long polemical on faith and grace, and of course, Martin Luther's reading of Romans is what helped incite the Protestant Reformation.

But I think these verses resonate with us more now than ever, as we are well into our second year of pandemic. It is hard, sometimes, to feel God's presence in the midst of turmoil. (See also Psalm 46!) But we know that nothing can separate us from the love of God. And conversely, nothing can separate the love of God from us.

Maple grandeur has been on display for most of the fall. The colors have been great this fall and have lasted longer than usual it seems to me. But I am biased. Besides the syrup, the inner bark and seeds are edible. But don't just eat the syrup. It has lots of minerals and some good health benefits. When you bake, try using maple syrup instead of white sugar. $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of maple syrup is equal to a cup of white sugar. You will need to add about $\frac{1}{3}$ to a $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of flour to make up for the added liquid. But the taste is amazing!

We have made a lot of significant changes to the syrup shack this year. Lee Hoekstra has done most of the work, with Kyle Flatin and my brother-in-law helping as well. We added a new wall so we could get more wood under the roof. We changed some shelving. And are in the process of upgrading the fireboxes and evaporator pans. Gary Wilhemson is helping a lot, with Lee and myself, to get a 1,000 gallon bulk tank out to the shack. This will more than double our storage of sap. Thanks to Donna and Junior Van Gundy of Houston for the magnificent gift!

I hope we can have another Woodcutting Bee November 16 starting at 9:00 a.m. Many thanks to those who have come out for the other Bees — Dr. Jim Gray, Lee Hoekstra, Gerald Oakes, Jeff Ellingson (who also goes out other times) Roxy and Bob Finnesgard, Gary Wilhelmson and Red Longmire.

OCTOBER 13, 2021 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Updates:

- Our Confirmation program has 55 youth from five area churches Trinity, Mabel First, Scheie, Wilmington, and Waterloo Ridge. There are 10 mentor groups. Adults in the congregation are leading elective courses for the Confirmation youth to learn and experience faith in real life.
- Confirmation Retreat to Expeditions Unlimited in Baraboo, WI, on November 5-7. Thirty youth have signed up.
- Sunday School is using the Rotational Sunday School Curriculum. Still looking for teachers and guides for throughout the year.
- Release Time for K-5th grade started October 6. Pr. Len Liptack teaches, Kerri Jahnke provides Faith 5 activities, songs, and games.
- Youth Group for 4th-6th grades will be once a month after school from 3:30-5:30 p.m.
- The Community Picnic hosted by the Outreach Team during Music in the Park raised enough money to purchase 50 winter coats, 5 sets of gloves and hats, and several coloring books for Afghan refugees in Wisconsin.
- The Outreach Team is working on Cheer Packages for young adults (ages 18-22).
- The Mission in the World Team helped load kits and quilts for Lutheran World Relief that were delivered to La Crosse. There were 112 quilts, 279 school kits, and 92 layettes. Faith Lutheran of Blackhammer also brought boxes to load onto our trailer. Thank you to Jeff Ellingson for the use of his trailer and for delivering the items to La Crosse.
- Worship Team is looking for extra organists and tech substitutes for Rick Sundet.
- The organ was tuned and while they were here they also worked-up an estimated value of the organ for insurance purposes. The organ is valued at \$725,000.
- Facilities Planning Team Update: There will be four sessions for the congregation to evaluate the plans with a question-and-answer period. Today's project estimate is \$1.7 million. \$100,000 is contingent. The flooring underneath the basement needs repair as well as the south windows.
- Diversity Conversations Update: The first step in the process of becoming a Reconciling in Christ church, according to the Building an Inclusive Church toolkit, is to "Build a Foundation," starting with a group of passionate people who lead their faith community through a welcoming journey. The Core Team typically starts with 3-8 people, but will grow as the journey continues. Some members of the Diversity Conversations group have agreed to become part of this Core Team.

Motions passed:

- To allow the Spring Grove Assisted Living facility to use Trinity Lutheran as a temporary evacuation space.
- To approve Jaxon Strinmoen, Elijah Solum, Ellie Halverson, and Maria Albrecht for Confirmation.
- To approve the hiring of Logan Olson as Trinity Handbell Choir Director beginning September 22, 2021 through May 2022.

WE ARE INVITED INTO SILENCE

There are very few times in my life when I experience silence. There is the everpresent ambient noise of the city or the office: traffic, planes, power mowers, power tools, the intrusive alerts from computers signaling new emails or texts, ringtones. I find myself obsessively plugged in to the news, Twitter and YouTube—all available all the time, portable and near at hand on my cellphone.

And then there is the noise in my head: racing thoughts, internal conversations, grocery lists, music. Even—or perhaps especially—when the world around me is mostly still, I notice that I am not.

I'm not sure what drives this acoustic and mental busyness, but I know I'm not the only one who so seldom experiences silence. Maybe we are just trying to get more stuff done. Maybe it's FOMO—fear of missing out. Maybe it's habit.

I do know that this constant noise and stimulation can be exhausting and stressful. The more noise, the louder we become in order to be heard, which leads to more noise.



In recent weeks we have been overwhelmed by disasters, natural and human-made. The West Coast is burning, and the Gulf Coast and East Coast are drowning. The elected Afghan government has fallen, and that 20-year war has come to an end. We are still stuck in this pandemic. We worry about our children who are too young to get vaccinated. We worry about our elders with comorbidities. We worry about ourselves.

In an effort to make sense of all this, we seek to gather more information and more data, which we hope will give us answers or show us a way out. There is no shortage of voices. We are bombarded with experts and pundits analyzing everything, talking and talking and talking. STOP.

The prophet Elijah had a profound experience of silence. He was fleeing for his life from the wrath of Jezebel. I imagine the stress was generating a lot of internal noise. But the word of the Lord came to Elijah and said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by" (1 Kings 19:11).

And then we read: "Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence" (11-12).

Wind and earthquakes and fire all seem reasonable when God makes an entrance. There are many instances in Scripture when God is announced in sound and pyrotechnics. But this story from 1 Kings has always caught my attention. The phrase in verse 12 is often translated as the sound of "a still, small voice." Yet it wasn't the sound of a voice that indicated that God was present. It was the sound of sheer silence. "When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and stood at the entrance of the cave" (13).

Silence.

Spending time in silence is a spiritual discipline. My spiritual director urges me to spend 20 minutes in silence every day. I can do about five. Silence is not a technique but a way of being in God's presence. It's pretty simple, but it's not easy. Sheer silence silences us—all of our defenses and self-justifications. It can be terrifying because in silence there is nothing between the soul and its source of being. No wonder that Elijah, when he heard the sound of sheer silence, wrapped his face in his mantle. He was in the presence of the Holy.

We are invited into silence. In the words of the hymn: "Let all mortal flesh keep silence, and with fear and trembling stand; ponder nothing earthly minded, for with blessing in his hand Christ our God to earth descending comes full homage to demand" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, 490).

"DO YOU SEE GOD IN ME?" HOW LUTHERANS ENGAGE IN DIFFICULT CONVERSATIONS

With a global pandemic, a tumultuous election and social justice issues coming to the fore over the past year, many have found themselves engaged in difficult conversations with family, friends, parishioners and even total strangers. These discussions can sometimes be productive, but they can also lead to hurt feelings, misunderstandings and disagreements.

In a world shaped by 24-hour cable news, social media and misinformation spread online, how can Lutherans cut through the noise and speak to each other with civility, compassion and understanding? How can we approach sensitive topics from a faith-based perspective and facilitate discussions in which we truly listen to each other—discussions that bring us closer rather than drive us apart?

"It's really good to have those experiences of seeing life from a different perspective, being a little uncomfortable," Sarah Trone Garriott said. "And that gets you to a place where you are engaging with people who are different from you and having those hard conversations."

It's also important to see people as individuals rather than members of one political party or group. The pastor of a "purple congregation" that skews slightly more conservative, Pr. Seth Nelson tries to approach controversial topics in a way that allows members to see issues on more personal level. Nelson said minimizing the partisan mentality helps defuse the "us-versus-them" thinking that dominates mass media and social media platforms.

Since the killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery and other people of color sparked protests and renewed calls for racial justice last summer, many people in the United States have engaged, and are continuing to engage, in difficult conversations about race and in anti-racism work. "We have to go past 'love your neighbor,'" Pr. Kwame Pitts said. "It goes beyond the general surface—it's getting down to the dirty and doing the work to understand each other."

Seeing each other as children of God will help make these conversations not only possible but successful. "Do you see God in me?" Pr. Pitts asked. "Because if you see God in me, then there's hope. But if you look at me and start questioning my humanity, there's no hope."

Taking a faith-based approach to these conversations, Police Chaplain Megan Rohrer said, has helped people see them as not just a transgender person but a fellow child of God. Rohrer reported that some people have apologized for judging them initially, adding, "I would really encourage people to notice when others have changed their mind."

No matter how difficult these conversations may be—whether they center on politics, race, trauma or identity—they are worth the hard work and can help change people, and the world, for the better.

"Our church has changed, our world has changed, our families have changed, the schools we go to have changed, confirmation has changed, [but] we freeze people in time, and often in their worst moments. ... The more we can remind ourselves God is about thawing people—and if Jesus' worst moment on the cross cancels out our worst moments—we can have forgiveness of others."






