Dear people of God,

Do you remember your Confirmation verse? The passage above, from Paul's letter to the Romans, is mine. It's a passage I *chose* because of a song I learned at Bible Camp, and it still resonates with me to this day.

Chosen-ness is our continuing theme.

As I mentioned last month, this year our current Confirmation students are watching the television program "The Chosen," in which we ponder what it means to be "called by name," to belong to God, to be chosen.

This Sunday is Reformation Sunday — the 505<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation, and also the day 19 of our youth affirm their baptisms. It's one of the big festival days in the Lutheran church. The paraments are red — and you are encouraged to wear red as well! We traditionally begin the service by processing in to "A Mighty Fortress," which was, of course, written by Martin Luther himself. We also traditionally serve Holy Communion on Reformation Sunday. But I think it's the Affirmation of Baptism service that makes this day so special.

Most of us don't remember our baptisms (though I have had the great good pleasure of baptizing two teenagers recently, plus a handful of children old enough to remember the "cross on the forehead" part of the service in the future). So what makes the Affirmation service so special is the *choice*. Typically, it is parents who *choose* to have their child baptized. But at the Affirmation service, it is a decision made by the individual. Each of them has *chosen* to attend three years of Confirmation, and memorize certain things, and have frank discussions about God with their peers and a mentor on a weekly basis. They've participated in lock-ins and gone on youth trips and taken elective courses that enhanced their understanding of God and each other. And unfortunately, this year's class also did much of it on Zoom because of the pandemic. To finish this program is a big deal. So I am excited about this Sunday's service. And not just because I get to wear my fancy red stole! (Though that is pretty cool.)

The choices made by the parents and Godparents of these youth are important. The *choices* made by these youth are important. The *choices* made by the congregation to support these youth are important. And I hope these youth continue to *choose* to be a part of this fellowship of believers throughout their lives.

But ultimately it is God who *chose* these youth as his precious and beloved children. And that is a *choice* that will never change.

See you Sunday! (Wear red — I will be!)

#### John 18:38 "What is truth?" retorted Pilate.

This is the question Pilate asks Jesus the night before the crucifixion. One of the most profound and eternally significant questions in the Bible was posed by an unbeliever. Pilate—the man who handed Jesus over to be crucified—turned to Jesus in His final hour, and asked, "What is truth?" It was a rhetorical question, a cynical response to what Jesus had just revealed: "I have come into the world, to testify to the truth." What is interesting is Jesus (truth of God) answers the question by just standing in front of Pilate.

These days there is a lot of disagreement as to what is truth. Everyone seems to have their own truth they want to follow and insist that others believe as well. This includes politics, environment, social constructs, etc. In Scripture, the word 'truth' happens 10 different times in the Old and New Testaments. The Bible has much to say about truth and directly relates it to God. In fact, the definition of truth in "Harper's Bible Dictionary" includes the statement that "God is truth."

I understand Jesus as God's truth. Jesus becomes the lens through which I see the world. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 22, "Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, 23 but we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, 24 but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God."

MISSION TRIP FOR HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH — July 9-15, 2023 Our high school youth (grades 9-12) will be traveling to the Mission in Cheyenne River, South Dakota this coming summer. This reservation is full of rich stories, beautiful scenery, and diverse culture. But like many Native American reservations, its history is also marred by hardship and injustice — the effects of which can still be felt today. Alcoholism, drugs, unemployment, abuse, and suicide all impact family dynamics and the larger community on a daily basis.

Our desire is to humbly walk alongside the friendships we have built and faithfully support the local organizations who work day in and day out on the reservation. Although families and individuals on the reservation face many challenges, there is hope. We know that Jesus deeply cares about this community and He is empowering individuals from Cheyenne River to rise up, advocate for their community, feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and love the broken. God is there, and God is working.

While every partnership and project looks different, our goal is to meet the tangible, physical needs of people living on Cheyenne River. Usually this involves teams of students working on trailers and homes across the reservation. Even though our primary platform for partnership on Cheyenne River is construction-based, the heart of our ministry is relational. Students will have the chance to spend meaningful time with community members and hopefully leave their trip with a better understanding of the Cheyenne River Sioux tribe.

With Cheyenne River being a relatively new site, we are working hard to foster trusting relationships with the community. With your help, we will continue to be able to build relationships with families and organizations that are founded on trust, rooted in humility, and centered on learning.

#### WITH OUR HANDS WE SERVE

WELCA has had a year of service using our hands with guidance by our Creator of these hands. Many of us are feeling comfortable once again to work together in person and the return of laughter and conversation to our gatherings is delightful. We were blessed to provide 148 quilts, 228 school kits and 154 baby



care kits to Lutheran World Relief (LWR) with the help of the Mission Team loading boxes and transporting them to La Crosse for central pick up. The proceeds of the meatball dinner were given as follows: Campus Ministries \$200, LWR shipping \$200, Trinity Care Team \$100, Trinity Love Day \$500, and Trinity Steeple Repair Fund \$5,000. #### A COMMON WITNESS

October 14, 2022

One of the distinct privileges of this call as presiding bishop is seeing the church at work at home and around the world. The Lutheran movement is alive and well, speaking the gospel in a distinctive voice. Sunday after Sunday the good news is proclaimed in accordance with Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions. In hundreds of languages and dialects, God's promise of grace, reconciliation and freedom is received and celebrated in places Martin Luther never knew existed. We are part of a worldwide family.



In many ways, and in the most important ways, we are alike. The cross is our center. Faith, grace and Scripture alone are our guides. A clear understanding of human brokenness and

our inability to save ourselves sets us apart from societal and even some theological pressures that would try to draw us away from the source of our life and freedom. A world built on works and individualism promises salvation based on our own effort and denies salvation if we fail. The Lutheran movement points to another way. This is our common witness.

There are also glorious expressions particular to regions, countries and history: governance; organization; the role of laity, deacons, pastors and bishops; and the age for first communion, to name a few. And that's just the ELCA! Around the world the expression of Lutheranism takes on many different flavors—literally and figuratively.

In the Northern Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa, porridge is a staple at all meals, so they pray, "Give us today our daily porridge." Spiritual healers are an important part of the life and ministry in the Lutheran church in Madagascar. Lutherans in Mexico celebrate the feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe, which falls just a day away from the Swedish celebration of Santa Lucia. Lutherans around the world hold fast to the core and adapt to make the gospel accessible.

A world built on works and individualism promises salvation based on our own effort and denies salvation if we fail. The Lutheran movement points to another way.

Part of Luther's genius was to make Scripture, preaching and worship available in the language of the people. In fact, this year we celebrate the 500th anniversary of the publication of his translation of the New Testament from the ancient Greek into the German language, known as the "September Testament." This publication paved the way for other translations of the Bible, making it accessible for people both at church and in their homes. All these variations make the Lutheran movement richer, especially when we share across borders and cultures.

It's good to remember the events of the 16th century, but we shouldn't get stuck there. We need to ask what it means to be Lutheran in the 21st century. What it means for the Lutheran World Federation's 149 member churches, representing over 77 million members in 99 countries, that are exploring Lutheran identity. For some member churches with a state church tradition—Sweden, for example—Lutheran identity is a novel concept. The Lutheran church was "The Church," and there was no need to think about identity. Now many churches in Africa and Asia are forging an indigenous expression of what it means to be Lutheran. Yes, they still sing hymns set to German, Swedish and American hymn tunes, but they are also developing music and worship using traditional instruments and styles.

What will our Lutheran identity be in the ELCA? We still treasure our immigrant roots—and we should. But if our ethnic identities become synonymous with Lutheran identity, we are missing the mark. The gospel, and Luther's clear exposition of it, transcends human boundaries. When a single culture's vernacular becomes the established language of the people, we hinder the gospel's free course in the world. We can become an alternative face of Christianity in the culture—one that moves across divisions, is meant for all, and that is a free and liberating gift.


