PROPOSED BUILDING ADDITION

More than 30 years ago, Anna Rosendahl saw a need for a ground level gathering space at Trinity Lutheran Church and she left a bequest to Trinity for this purpose. Her bequest has continued to grow. In 2019, the Visioning & Planning Team was formed to survey the congregation about space needs. This team's work resulted in specific recommendations about the future growth and enhancement for Trinity Lutheran Church. Surveys and/or interviews were completed by 112 members.

The key findings were:

- 1. the need for additional enhanced space such as a welcome/ fellowship area and making all areas accessible
- 2. storage including improved restrooms and multi-purpose space
- 3. retain sanctuary, stained-glass windows, and historical beauty of the original structure.

At the 2019 Annual Meeting, the congregation voted to have the Facility Planning Team hire an architect to create a plan to present to the congregation. The first two plans lacked the vision the committee felt the congregation needed and/or wanted. Before a third plan could be created, COVID-19 developed, which paused the entire project. The committee reconvened in Spring 2021 and refined and reduced the two original plans to create an addition that complements the existing structure. This final proposed plan was tweaked slightly to the revision you see on the next page. Some key areas include:

- Pastors, Youth Ministry, and Office Staff on ground level
- Ground level entrance with staircases to Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall
- Canopy entrance
- · Existing elevator maintained
- Northside stain-glass windows retained inside new structure and viewable with the cathedral ceiling

This proposed plan will need congregation approval once more details are obtained. The Facility Planning Team unanimously agrees that enhancing our space in this way will also enhance and help grow the ministries of the church, the ministries to which God is calling us.

The existing plans are available for viewing in the Middle Room at Trinity and we also plan to mark the proposed structure on the pavement to show size. We will host several detailed information sessions once we have more specifics regarding potential cost.


In 2020, a generous donor gave \$500,000 for this project, in 2021 another donor gave \$90,000, and additional donations continue to be given for this project. To date we have around \$800,000 and this amount continues to grow.

Dear people of God,

In the first line of the Apostle's Creed, which we recite together in worship immediately following the sermon on most Sundays, we confess our common Christian belief that everything we have comes from God. "Everything" includes not just our resources, but also our time, skills, talents, and gifts. There are multiple ways to give back to God what we have first been given.

This is the time of year when our Finance Team begins putting together a budget for the next year. They look at where we've allocated our resources in the past, they solicit information from each of the Ministry Teams of the congregation, and then ... they try to get it to balance. There is give and take (literally), and multiple drafts are reviewed before a final budget is ready for the congregation to approve at the Annual Meeting in January.

Recently, I attended an online seminar led by Michael R. Ward, and all our Congregation Council members are now reading his book "Abundance." "Abundance" offers inspirational guidance that can transform the budgeting process. It helps us focus on what God is calling us to do at this time in this place: Vibrant worship. Exciting faith formation. Meaningful fellowship. Neighborhood support.

"As we think about where we want to get involved, we cannot do it all. However, as we financially support our congregation this year, we are involved in all of this. Not all of us are called to be teachers, but offerings support teaching and passing on faith to kids. Not all of us have the gifts to comfort the grieving, but our financial gifts provide for great pastoral care. Not all of us have the time to go out and feed the hungry, but we can all give significantly according to our means so that the hungry can be fed." ("Abundance," Mike Ward, pp. 192-3)

As you consider your gifts to the congregation, dream big. God has blessed this congregation abundantly, and we have been able to bless others as a result. What is God calling us to do as we go forth from here? I'm so excited to find out!

God was trying to soothe me and talk to me the whole time, but I couldn't hear for all the shouting I was doing.

HEARING-LOOP SYSTEM Trinity has a hearing-loop system that allows people with hearing impairment to receive a signal directly from the sanctuary microphones free of reverberation or other ambient noise interference. To use this system, **please sit in a pew that is in the two main sections of pews** (not the side pews). If you have a hearing aid that **has a t-coil** in it, simply turn that switch on in your hearing aid to automatically receive this direct signal in the sanctuary. You may need to adjust the volume.

If your hearing aid <u>does not have a t-coil</u> or if you <u>do not use a</u> hearing aid, but would like an extra hearing boost, you can use

one of the receivers which are available at each sanctuary entrance (see illustration to the right). **There are two components:** the receiver itself on a lanyard, and a head-set. Put the lanyard around your neck, letting the receiver hang straight down. Plug the head-set into the spot on the top end of the receiver. Turn the power knob on, and adjust the volume. At the end of service, return the receiver and headset making sure the receiver is turned OFF. Instructions cards with this information are available at each of the sanctuary entrances, ask an usher if you have questions.

SEPTEMBER 8, 2021 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Updates

- We invited Mabel First Lutheran to Join our Confirmation program this year, they have accepted and will be added to our program. We invited Scheie Lutheran as well, and we are waiting to hear back from them.
- Looking for adults to lead ELECTIVE classes for our fall trimester of Confirmation.
- Working with Pastor Len Liptack and Principal Kjelland to plan Release Time. The Program will start October 6 for K-6th grades.
- 4th 6th grade Youth Group starting this fall, meet once per month, a Wednesday after school 3:30 5:30pm
- Prayer Shawl ministry has been on pause. It's been a couple of years since shawls have been given. The Care Ministry Team is currently working on a list of people who need the prayer shawls. Council members asked to let the team know of someone or a family who are in need of the ministry.
- Fridge in kitchen running constantly. Hammes Refrigeration will be coming to look at the fridge and fix the issue.
- Shared that Paul Morken stated that the sidewalks, curb, and gutter are being done next year on the west side of the church.
- Scott Solberg, Choir director, agreed to continue in his temporary contract as choir rehearsals begin in September. His former contract will resume when restrictions on indoor singing are lifted.
- A proposal for 2022 salaries for staff and pastors was sent to the Finance Team. The suggested increases were made based on a wage freeze for pastors and staff in 2021.
- Diversity Conversations update: Group is working on putting together a lending library that has information about inclusion. Looking for resources for an online speaker–Viterbo has some resources for speakers regarding diversity. Next meeting is on September 21 at 6:30pm, at Joe's Coffee House.
- Need to cut \$50,000 to have a balanced budget. Council reviewed the initial budget line by line. Some things were decreased, and some things increased. Barb and Judy will take the revisions back to Lorilyn Dehning to revise.
- Saundy reported a couple of items that need to be looked at by the Property Team: bell tower and bell rope, screen, sacristy doors (Gary will work on shaving off the bottom of the doors so they are easier to open and close.).
- Pr. Elizabeth would like the council members to read the book, *Abundance: Creating a Culture of Generosity* by Michael R. Ward, for our next book study. The book is about mission God is calling us to a particular mission in this time.

MY TAKE: TEAR DOWN MAGICAL WALLS

A universal neighborhood

In <u>The Scattering: Imagining a Church That Connects Faith and Life</u> (Wipf and Stock, 2015), Dwight L. DuBois says congregations need to close the gap between what they do when gathered behind church doors and how they live when sent beyond those doors in Christ's name. They need to create a universal neighborhood of all believers.

This means taking our baptismal promises seriously again, found in the Affirmation of Baptism (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*).

Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

To live among God's faithful people?

To hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper?

We need to affirm that everything we do as the gathered church forms us for a distinctive way of life. Worship practices are life practices. Confessing our sins trains us for the practice of telling the truth. Singing hymns forms us to thank and praise God. Hearing God's word centers us in the gospel for every life circumstance.

Congregations are summoned to form members who can connect faith and life. This requires adaptive change to turn congregations inside-out.

Confessing the creed is our pledge of allegiance. The intercessions both bring our concerns to God and commit us to responsibility in caring about the people and needs for which we pray. Passing the peace prepares us for everyday reconciliation and peacemaking. At the Lord's table, we discover radical mercy and hospitality that become our way of life. When we are sent out into the world, our worship practices will have shaped us for discipleship in daily life.

Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

To proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed?

To serve all people, following the example of Jesus?

To strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

Congregations are summoned to form members who can connect faith and life. This requires adaptive change to turn congregations inside-out. Educational programs for all ages should begin to explore what faith means for daily life. Members should be invited to testify about how their Christian faith makes a difference in the world.

Pastors should develop dialogue sermons in partnership with members to talk about intersections between faith and life. Small groups should bring people together for prayer and conversation based on affinities they share—their family roles, their jobs, their season of life. All these practices transform congregations into incubators where being church means living out our Christian vocation in everything we say and do.

What does this look like in people's lives? It looks like people speaking authentically about the difference Jesus Christ makes in all life circumstances. It looks like people who claim everything they do as a way of living out their baptismal promises in service to others.


