

Special Congregational Meeting Results: Shining Windows on the Way

The congregation voted overwhelmingly to proceed with the restoration of the three stained-glass windows on the south side of the sanctuary at the Special Congregational Meeting on Sunday, September 25. Cost for these three windows — which includes complete historic restoration, special coating, and all-new storm window systems — will be approximately \$80,000 and begin early in 2023. (See information in the September newsletter for details about the work.)

After much research, the Master Planning Committee selected Staige Stained and Leaded Glass Restoration in Onalaska, WI, to do the work. Staige has been in business for more than 50 years and has done beautiful work on historic stained-glass windows in area churches, including Rushford and Decorah.

A number of families have given or pledged a donation to the windows project already – thank you so much



for your generosity! As a result, we already have nearly \$40,000 in the bank to complete this project, with a matching donation of \$30,000 pledged. If you are able to contribute to this important legacy project, there is a contribution form on the next to last page of this newsletter that you can fill out and return with your donation. "But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: 'Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.'" Isaiah 43:1

Dear people of God,

We at Trinity are familiar with the passage from Isaiah above – it's referenced on the large banner at the front of the sanctuary: "I have called you by name, you are mine." When we celebrate a baptism, when we celebrate the life of someone who's died, when we celebrate a wedding couple or confirmation or first communion, we include the names on the banner. It reminds us that God calls us from the moment of our birth (and even before! – see Psalm 139:13), through every important event in our lives, and at our deaths.

But what does it mean to be "called by name," to belong to God, to be chosen?

This year our confirmation youth will be watching and learning about the story of Jesus through the eyes of his chosen family, friends, and co-workers through the ground-breaking television series "The Chosen."

"Being chosen by Jesus has beautiful and far-reaching implications – although it says even more about the Chooser than the choosees. We are loved because He's love. We are saved because He's merciful. We belong to the family of God because Jesus invites us, making the Bible and all its promises as true for us today as it was for God's chosen nation." (excerpted from The Chosen Interactive Bible Study)



Each week during confirmation, our 40-plus youth and their 8 mentors will share a meal and fellowship. After the meal, they'll watch part of "The Chosen" series together, then break up into their mentor groups to share their impressions, answer leading questions, and discuss the Biblical context surrounding the program.

I am extremely excited to share this amazing program with our youth (Thank you, Nolie Kapplinger for sharing it with me!). And you are invited to watch this amazing program as well. The series can be streamed FREE from an app on your smart phone or tablet, or you can watch it on your computer at https://watch.angelstudios.com/thechosen. The series is also available on DVD for purchase.

"The Chosen" draws from all four Gospels of the New Testament and makes references to the Old, with intertwining story threads from the Old to the New Testament that are intricate and profound. Dr. Douglas S. Huffman, Professor of New Testament at Talbot School of Theology, was the official evangelical biblical consultant for the series.

I welcome you to join Kerri, our youth, their mentors, and me as we travel through the life of Jesus this year and learn, again, what it means to be chosen.



BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS: OCTOBER 4

St. Francis of Assisi, whose feast day is October 4th, loved the larks flying about his hilltop town. He and his early brothers, staying in a small hovel, allowed themselves to be displaced by a donkey. Francis wrote a Canticle of the Creatures, an ode to God's living things. "All praise to you, Oh Lord, for all these brother and sister creatures."

There are more than 62 million cats in the U.S. and 52 million dogs. The bond between person and pet is like no other relationship because the communication between fellow creatures is at its most basic. And our farm animals, as well, are important to us.

The Blessing of Animals usually goes like this:

"Blessed are you, Lord God, maker of all living creatures. You called forth fish in the sea, birds in the air and animals on the land. You inspired Saint Francis to call all of them his brothers and sisters. We ask you to bless this animal. By the power of your love, enable it to live according to your plan. May we always praise you for all your beauty in creation. Blessed are you, Lord our God, in all your creatures! Amen."

Some people criticize the amount and cost of care given to pets. People are more important, they say. Care for poor people instead of poodles. And certainly our needy fellow humans should not be neglected. However, every creature is important. The love we give to a pet, and receive from a pet, can draw us more deeply into the larger circle of life, into the wonder of our common relationship to our Creator.

Trinity Lutheran will celebrate the Blessing of Animals on October 9 at our 9:15 a.m. outdoors, weather permitting. The blessing will occur at the end of the service. Please keep your animals on leashes or in crates until the blessing. If you plan to bring a larger animal to be blessed (they are welcome!) please call the church office ahead of time.

TRINITY CENTER UPDATE Last winter, the boiler at Trinity Center died. We were able to maintain heat in the building with space heaters so that Beary Patch Preschool could finish out the year there. But with the advent of a 4K program at the school, the Congregation Council made the decision to close Trinity Center. The school is currently using some of the building for additional storage, for an additional fee paid to the church.

The only remaining program traditionally hosted at Trinity Center is Release Time. We are very blessed to have partnered with Giants in the Earth Heritage Center to host Release Time there this year. This will save the church thousands of dollars in utilities and maintenance costs.

After this trial year, we will determine if it's feasible and practical to invest our stewardship dollars in Trinity Center. The building has been a faithful servant of the church for 60 years, and we give thanks for all who made that possible.

MISSION TRIP FOR HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH — July 9-13, 2023

Our high school youth (grades 9-12) will be traveling to the Mission in Cheyenne River, South Dakota this coming summer. This reservation is full of rich stories, beautiful scenery, and diverse culture. But like many Native American reservations, its history is also marred by hardship and injustice — the effects of which can still be felt today. Alcoholism, drugs, unemployment, abuse, and suicide all impact family dynamics and the larger community on a daily basis.

Our desire is to humbly walk alongside the friendships we have built and faithfully support the local organizations who work day in and day out on the reservation. Although families and individuals on the reservation face many challenges, there is hope. We know that Jesus deeply cares about this community and He is empowering individuals from Cheyenne River to rise up, advocate for their community, feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and love the broken. God is there, and God is working.

While every partnership and project looks different, our goal is to meet the tangible, physical needs of people living on Cheyenne River. Usually this involves teams of students working on trailers and homes across the reservation. Even though our primary platform for partnership on Cheyenne River is construction-based, the heart of our ministry is relational. Students will have the chance to spend meaningful time with community members and hopefully leave their trip with a better understanding of the Cheyenne River Sioux tribe.

With Cheyenne River being a relatively new site, we are working hard to foster trusting relationships with the community. With your help, we will continue to be able to build relationships with families and organizations that are founded on trust, rooted in humility, and centered on learning.

WE ARE WOVEN TOGETHER

He was a young man. In his early 20s. He had cancer. His mother and stepfather cared for him to the point of weariness. The family was unchurched, but a friend was a member of our parish and asked if I could visit them. That's how I came to walk with them in the last months.

There were hospitalizations and finally palliative care. The young man endured with stoic courage. His mother and stepfather never waivered in their care. Friends supported the family by bringing meals and sometimes just sitting in silence with them. At last, the call I knew was coming came. The young man had died.



I drove to the farmhouse past the cemetery where he would be buried. When I arrived the stepfather opened the door and motioned me to the living room. The young man had died in his mother's arms. He had stopped shaving some weeks before, so his beard had grown in. Mother cradling the body of her dead son. It was a modern-day pietà.

In my time with the family, I found out that the stepfather was not baptized. I'll call him Jim. We had many talks sitting at the wooden kitchen table—some profound, some less so.

And Jim had questions: not so much why this had happened to his stepson, but where was God? Where was hope? He knew his wife and son had been baptized. Jim wanted to know what that meant, what difference it made.

I answered that God was with Jim's stepson in his pain. I explained that baptism was the gift of life that brought forgiveness, that baptism made us part of the body of Christ, the church, and that baptism made those who had been strangers from God and each other part of the same

family. I told him that baptism was an unbreakable relationship between God and God's people because God loves us and doesn't want to lose a single one of us, that not even death can separate us from God's love.

Jim asked to be baptized. He came to the realization that, as it has been said, water really is thicker than blood. Baptism doesn't guarantee a life without struggle or hardship, but it makes us part of the one who suffered, died and was buried—and who, through that suffering and death, defeated death. So, at that wooden kitchen table with a stainless steel mixing bowl filled with water, Jim was baptized into Christ.

FROM THE DEAD THROUGH THE GLORY OF
THE FATHER, SO WE TOO MIGHT WALK IN
NEWNESS OF LIFE.
ROMANS 6:4

"Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" (Romans 6:3-5).

We have been through a difficult season in our country and our church. I'm not sure if we will ever completely

understand the effects of the pandemic's stress on all of us. The pandemic laid bare racial inequities and disparities in access to medical care, housing, employment and law enforcement. Civic discourse has become coarse and mean. Life is seen as a zero-sum game—if your side gets something then mine loses out.

This is also played out in the church. Of course there is room for debate and disagreement, there is room to call out one part of the church when it has hurt another. There is even room for justified anger. But there is no room to dissolve the bond of baptism. It isn't even possible. In Christ we are individually members one of another. Sometimes we might feel like we are stuck with each other. This is the great mystery and beauty of the wounded body of Christ—we are woven together. Praise the One who makes us one.

- Report improved health, health behavior, and a sense of confidence in managing their diabetes.
- Show improvements in blood sugar levels and a decrease in health distress and hypo- and hyperglycemia.
- Feel more confident in their ability to communicate with physicians.
- Have fewer doctor and emergency room visits and fewer hospitalizations.

SEPTEMBER 14, 2022 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Updates:

- HIP materials and supplies are now being stored at the church.
- Quilts for Lutheran World Relief will be transported on October 8.
- Mary Deters is managing the Handbell Choir while staffing arrangements are being considered.
- There is an issue with water on the west side of the church. A company doing steeple repairs in Rushford will be contacted to checkout the problem.
- Stewardship Team will present a Temple Talk on Sunday, October 16.
- We will need someone to be in charge of the AED machine care and maintenance and also have someone with CPR training.
- The school is paying an extra \$900 for storage at Trinity Center.
- The Annual Meeting is set for February 5, 2023. On March 5, 2023, a special informational meeting will be held to present the reports of the endowment committees.

Motions passed:

• to purchase a desktop computer with monitor and two cameras at the cost of \$2,400 for broadcasting services, using money from the Media Ministry fund account.






