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



Dear Easter People!

Three weeks ago, I had never heard of "Zoom." Now I Zoom every day. (Zoom, by the way, is a magic internet thingy that lets us have meetings wearing our comfy clothes, in our own homes, with other people wearing their comfy clothes, in their own homes.) We have team meetings using Zoom. We have Confirmation using Zoom - with 45 people attending! Bekah uses Zoom for 3:16s and Middle School Game Night. Thursday we had our council meeting using Zoom.

Three weeks ago, I had never used Facebook Live. Now I (and Rachel S. and Bekah) record something on Facebook Live several times a week. Despite my intense fear of anything that looks like a camera. I don't think Bekah and Rachel mind the camera at all. Check it out!

Three weeks ago, Trinity didn't have a YouTube channel or a phone line dedicated to messages of HOPE. As of this writing, we have 12 videos on YouTube and I record a new 498-HOPE message every day. Check it out! Check it out!

Three weeks ago, a team of blessed people led by Jean Ellingson started calling every member of the congregation to check in, starting with the "81 over 80." Pastor Lane checks in with the folks he visits on a regular basis as well. Some of the circles are sending "Round Robin" email chains, complete with embedded hymns.

So much has changed in the last three weeks. But there is one thing that cannot change: Though we may feel separated from one-another, nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus.

The COVID-19 pandemic means we cannot be together right now as we used to be. As we want to be. As we hope to be. Especially during Holy Week. Especially on Easter Sunday. But God calls us, at this time and in this place, to love our neighbor in new and challenging ways. Right now, caring for our neighbor means staying at home more, washing our hands more, hand-sanitizing more and keeping our distance at least 6 feet. Right now, caring for our neighbor means trying out new technologies that help us connect in new and interesting ways. Right now, caring for our neighbor means attending church on the radio, on Facebook Live and on YouTube.


We will likely not be together for some weeks. But when we are back together, we will have a mighty Easter celebration. There will be trumpets and organ and voices and alleluias. Maybe we'll even dig up some lilies. (Not literally, of course.)

I want to close this letter with a quote from Bishop Regina Hassanally of the Southeast Minnesota Synod of the ELCA:

Remember this, dear People of God: it is the same God who called Abraham into an unknown land, who led Moses and the Israelites through wilderness and into promise, who worked through politics and circumstance to save God's people through Esther, and who tore through the heavens to proclaim Jesus as beloved Son that is with us still today. It is the same God. Our realities may change. God does not.

The promise is sure: Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever.

FROM PASTOR LANE

We've talked about God talking to Adam and Eve and God talking to Moses. So this month we will listen in when God talks to Elijah.

We are going to pick it up near the end of the story, but let me tell you what happens to lead up to it. In Kings 18 and 19, Israel as a whole had once again become unfaithful. Elijah wants to prove that God is Almighty and the God of Israel. He challenges all the prophets of Baal (a pagan religion that the Queen Jezebel adhered to). It is like the World Series, Stanley Cup, Super Bowl and whatever they call the Basketball Championship, all into one. Winner takes all. Loser gets killed. It is a very exciting story that would make a blockbusting movie. Elijah, our hero, wins and kills the other guys. Queen Jezebel sends a warning to Elijah that she will see him killed. Elijah runs for his life into the wilderness.

Elijah goes a day's journey into the wilderness. There he is ministered to by Angels of God to prepare him for a forty-day journey. He ends up at Mount Horeb in a cave. God comes to him and says, "What are you doing here?" Elijah tells the story and God tells him to go outside the cave because He is about to pass by.

Outside the cave there is all sorts of chaos happening – a great wind, an earthquake, a fire but God is not in them. And then the sound of sheer silence. It is in the silence that God asks again, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" And Elijah tells the story again. Then God lays out a plan for Elijah.

Sometimes life has all kinds of storms, troubles and business but God is not in them. It is in the silence after the chaos where God speaks to us. When we take time to go out and meet God. When all the chaos falls away, we may hear a plan, an idea, a comforting thought or just Grace. God is there.








MARCH 11, 2020 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- April 1 marked Pr. Elizabeth's two year anniversary at Trinity.
- The Root River Conference pastors met on March 10 with a presentation on church safety by Fillmore County Sheriff DeGeorge. Trinity has a Safe Church Policy.
- Empty Bowls event was a huge success; \$1,200 was raised.
- Property Team tested the parsonage for radon and results came back with elevated levels. They are collecting information on abatement procedures and options.
- Worship Team is looking at possible summer worship at Trollskogen Park.
- Update from Facilities Planning Committee: an initial presentation was given by Weiser Brothers and architect during a March 10 meeting. Even though the vision was met, the Committee felt the plan was oversized for our needs. The architect will reduce the footprint and redraw the plan.
- An All Team Retreat is tentatively planned for August 2.
- Beary Patch update: in October, the council voted to charge Beary Patch 10% of their gross tuition as the maintenance and utilities fee. Prior to this vote, Beary Patch gave an annual donation. Spring and fall programming and tuition fees have been set for Beary Patch.
- Response to the COVID-19 virus outbreak: beginning Sunday, March 15, there will be no offering plates passed, they will be at doors instead; communion ushers will be giving people hand sanitizer. (since the meeting, in-person worship and activities have been suspended until further notice.)

Next Meeting: held remotely on April 2 at 7:00 p.m. via Zoom. Complete minutes are on Trinity's website.



ENCOURAGING ONE ANOTHER IS THE FIFTH MARK OF DISCIPLESHIP

Editor's note: Christian discipleship is a lifelong journey of living out and spreading the good news of Jesus Christ so that others may believe. Over several issues, we have and will describe the seven marks of discipleship found in "Lessons for Today's Disciples" written by Valora K. Starr. You can find the resource by visiting welca.org/resources and searching for its title.

Encouraging others is work disciples can only do in community. This lesson will examine Jesus' example of encouragement as a natural part of teamwork and motivation to get the job done. Encouragement from others at just the right moment speaks volumes. It can mean the difference between giving up and knowing you're okay. The receiver knows someone cares and feels that she matters. Just as Jesus encouraged Peter to walk on water, we also are called to encourage others to stretch beyond what they think they can do. Encouragement in the faith community is not just a pep talk: It is an affirmation and blessed assurance of what God can do in our lives.

Read 1 Thessalonians 5:11–24. Jesus left a trail of "encouraging" accounts for the disciples and the early church. This mark of encouraging is meant to be practiced in community. The practice appears to be about how we treat others, but it has less to do with others than it does with the change that occurs in ourselves. The act of encouraging another places the encourager in the other's shoes. A deep sensitivity for the other's situation and circumstance is important, and you make a conscious decision to let your actions be guided by the Holy Spirit. Your words of encouragement have a two-fold effect—they are affirming for the other and faith-building for you.

Reflect on the ways we are called to encourage others. Make a list and explain how you would carry out each one. Hint: There are 11 more directives in verses 12–18.

Respond: Describe how you are encouraging others.

Personal Reflection This reflection will help you assess your practice of encouraging others. Be as honest and open as you can so that you get an accurate picture of where you are and where you want to go with this practice.

Assess the basics. Take a quick read of your practice of encouraging others.

- When do I encourage others?
- What prompts me to encourage others?
- Whom do I encourage?
- · How do I encourage others?

Remember that when we encourage others, we are ourselves encouraged. Our faith grows and the community benefits.

An important step after experiencing the Four Key Faith Practices in a small group or home setting is to bless and equip friends and families by using faith practices daily as an intentional step to encourage faith traditions in the home.

They provide an opportunity for people to learn, experience, and grow in their faith together. The next page is a discussion guide handout to assist with the conversations.



As you gather together, begin by sharing a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your lives and then use the outline below to talk about faith and God's presence in this moment.



Caring Conversations

Discuss these thoughts and questions:

- What concerns you about the coronavirus pandemic?
- With restaurants, gyms, and theaters closed, how do you spend your time?
- When worship services are canceled, in what way can you worship in your home?



Devotions

Read the following:

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? Matthew 6:25-30 (NRSV)
