

WORSHIP IN NOVEMBER: LEADING BY EXAMPLE AND WITH LOVE

"Lord, you have been our dwelling place throughout all generations. Before the mountains were born or you brought forth the whole world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God." Psalm 90:1-2

The Trinity COVID-19 Response Team* met on Tuesday, October 27, via Zoom and agreed that with the current community spread of COVID-19 that it is best for our community to suspend in-person worship and most other Trinity activities

for the month of November. We do this to lead by example and with love for the most vulnerable in our Trinity community, and for the community at large. All are welcome to attend worship on Sundays at 9:15 a.m. on Facebook Live or on the radio at KVIK 104.7 FM.



In addition, the following decisions were made regarding other Trinity activities during November:

- We will have drive-through communion in the parking lot on Sunday, Nov. 1 and Sunday, Nov. 15 following worship.
- We can safely have our All Saints luminaria celebration outside on the Main Street side of the church on Sunday, Nov. 1, from 5-7 p.m.
- Session 1 (week 5 of 5 classes) of our Confirmation program will conclude via Zoom and individual mentor groups on Nov. 4.
- The Wednesday Release Time program will continue to meet at Trinity Center in their limited-time, smaller-size school cohorts.
- Bekah is preparing "take-home" Sunday School materials for families for November and December.
- We will continue to host small family funerals in the sanctuary, with no visitation or fellowship. It is very important that COVID guidelines regarding masks and distancing be maintained at funerals.
- The AA group will continue to meet on Tuesdays and Saturdays to accommodate this crucial ministry during this time.

As this year's Confirmation students have learned, the church can never be "closed" because we are the church. Our ministries continue in the form of worship, care, outreach, education, and mission. As the psalmist reminds us, God, God's very self, is our dwelling place.

The Response Team will meet again in late November to evaluate current conditions in the surrounding community and make decisions about December Trinity activities. Thank you for your continued prayers for all those affected by COVID and for your ongoing support of Trinity's ministries.

Beloved Body of Christ,

The crowds were getting restless and the scribes and Pharisees were accusing Jesus of being a "ruler of demons" because he was able to cast out demons as well as heal the sick and feed the hungry. That's when Jesus responded: "How can Satan cast out Satan?...if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand."

(Mark 3:23b,25)

The scribes and Pharisees were always trying to draw lines in the sand between themselves and the followers of Jesus. Jesus, by his words as well as his actions, reminded them that to be in the Spirit of God is to be family, no matter your age or gender or race or origin. No lines in the sand. No sides. No divides. The Apostle Paul emphasized that core belief over and over in his letters to the young churches: We are one in the Spirit. We are the Body of Christ. Whatever differences we have, they are irrelevant compared to our shared belief in Christ.

Abraham Lincoln quoted Mark's gospel upon accepting his party's nomination to the Illinois Senate in 1858, garnering national attention and securing his ultimate rise to the presidency during the Civil War. His sentiments are as important today as they were 160 years ago.

"American politics is competitive, thrilling, frustrating – and infuriating. The stakes are high. Issues are important. Outcomes matter. This is why we care, and should care, about our politics. But do our politics have to be demonizing? Does it have to bring out the worst in us? Do our politics have to destroy the goodwill of our society? Is the dehumanizing of our fellow Americans something we should accept?" (braverangels.org*)

There is an election on Tuesday. I'm sure this is no surprise to you. The pundits talk about it incessantly, there are yard signs everywhere, and the candidates for all levels of government are in the news. And it's important. But whatever happens next Tuesday (or in the days to follow), nothing can change our unity as the Body of Christ.



BLACK AND WHITE: THE CONGREGATION COUNCIL READS AND ASKS QUESTIONS

On June 17, 2015, nine African Americans were killed during a Bible study at the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, SC. Police arrested 21-year-old white supremacist Dylann Roof (who grew up in the ELCA) the next day; he had attended the Bible study before he committed the shooting.

On May 25, 2020, George Floyd was killed in Minneapolis during an arrest for allegedly using a counterfeit bill. Derek Chauvin, a white police officer, knelt on Floyd's neck for almost nine minutes while Floyd was handcuffed and lying face down, repeatedly saying "I can't breathe." Two additional officers restrained Floyd while a fourth prevented bystanders from intervening. During the final three minutes, Floyd was motionless and had no pulse. Chauvin ignored onlookers' pleas to remove his knee until medics told him to.

These are just two of hundreds of stories about race in America. And truth to tell, the stories aren't always "black and white." But after George Floyd was killed, the Trinity Congregation Council felt called to begin a discussion about what it means to be church in a time of racial conflict. We started by reading "Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the U.S.," by Pr. Lenny Duncan.

Did you know that we – the ELCA – are the whitest denomination in the U.S.? What do you think it might be like to be a black person in this very white church? What are we doing to educate people about race in our church? What are we doing to facilitate better relationships? To facilitate inclusion and equity?


"Shifting demographics and shrinking congregations make all the headlines [about churches], but Duncan sees something else at work–drawing a direct line between the church's lack of diversity and the church's lack of vitality. Duncan gives a blueprint for the way forward and urges us to follow in the revolutionary path of Jesus." (Amazon)

During the summer, the Congregation Council was reading and discussing this book while also updating the congregation's constitution, which could result in updating the makeup of the council itself after the Annual Meeting next year. That's when the question arose: Should Trinity create a new team whose mission is all about diversity and inclusion? What would the team look like? What would be its focus? Who would like to be a member?

OCTOBER 14, 2020 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- Received EDA Grant of \$2,585.52. Used to purchase fogger for disinfecting, 2-channel power amp, wireless system with bodypack, additional Zoom account, and other items for modern media services.
- Updates/improvements made at Trinity Center replaced cement, fixed water draining problem, card key lock installed. Fire inspection completed and repairs done. Compressor for heating system needs repair.
- Discussion on creating an additional team (name not yet determined, possibilities: Equity Team, Congregation Climate Team, Diversity Team, Social and Racial Awareness Team). Goal: to bring attention to diversity in our community and world.
- September offering was short of budget. First six months of 2020, income is down 3.1% compared to 2019. Expenses for first nine months of 2020 were 6% higher than in 2019.

Motions passed:

- to approve bylaws
- to approve 11 confirmands and 7 new members
- to start an ad hoc Diversity Committee

HUMANITARIAN AID FOR REFUGEES, FEARED DESTROYED IN BEIRUT EXPLOSION, FOUND INTACT

BALTIMORE, Sept. 24, 2020 — Three 40-foot shipping containers filled with humanitarian aid that included thousands of handmade quilts and baby-care items, which were reported as destroyed in the August 4 explosions at the port of Beirut, Lebanon, have been found intact and are ready to be distributed to victims of the blast and refugees. Authorities assumed the containers were lost in the historic blast that killed more than 200 people and laid waste to parts of the city. It took several weeks for longtime Lutheran World Relief partner Anera to gain access to the port, locate the containers and check their contents. The contents of all four containers have been transferred to a warehouse and will be distributed to families displaced by the explosion, as well as to refugees living in Lebanon, principally from Syria and the Palestinian territories.

"It's an incredible blessing to realize that now these items are in exactly the right place at the right time," said Melanie Gibbons, deputy director for outreach and engagement at Lutheran World Relief.

<u>Braver Angels</u> was inspired by the words of Abraham Lincoln, who not only called on Americans to summon the "better angels" of our nature — but called on us to find the *courage* needed to pursue a more perfect union, "with malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right."

To meet the current moment, at this time of national crisis, we need more than civility. We need to challenge ourselves to work together when we disagree. We need bravery. Based on the tried and true communication

guidelines used in our workshops, we developed this Better Angels Social Media Pledge.



Pledge to follow these guidelines on social media. Pledge to do your part to promote civil discourse. Pledge to reduce polarization in America. (visit https://braverangels.org/take-the-better-angels-social-media-pledge/ to see the pledge and learn more about this organization.)

- 1) I will post with a goal of clarifying my point of view, and not attacking the other side. I will focus on expressing the values, facts and experiences that have shaped my view, not attacking the other side.
- 2) I will be civil and respectful. I won't say things or use a tone that I wouldn't use in a face-to-face conversation in a public setting. I won't call people names or use labels (idiots, snowflakes, etc.) I will treat people as individuals, not stereotypes representing an entire group. I won't use a condescending tone. I won't escalate unconstructive and hurtful dialogue. I will try to keep the conversation going, not to shut it down. When needed, I'll take it "offline."
- 3) I won't make blanket statements or over generalize. I will use facts and examples to explain my position. I won't make blanket "always/never statements." I will qualify my statements and viewpoints to leave room to explore topics more fully (sometimes, in my experience, in this case, etc.).
- 4) I won't try to convert people to my "side," I will encourage understanding and learning. (habits 2,3) I will acknowledge common ground and common values on both sides when I see it. I will ask honest (not loaded) questions. (Not questions that incriminate)
- 5) I will keep an open mind. I won't over simplify or fall into automatic "all or nothing" conclusions. I recognize most issues are very complicated, and good solutions require deep understanding and nuanced thinking. I know that an open mind is never 100% certain about everything. I will acknowledge my doubt, to myself and others, and engage with the goal of exploring different ways to see an issue or find a solution.







